Parochial School Civic Clubs Grow

Washington (AP) Some 3,000 Catholic Civic Clubs have been chartered in parochial schools throughout the country, according to an announcement by the Commission on American Citizenship of the Catholic University of America, which sponsors the clubs.

Projects sponsored by the clubs have included the study of local, State and Federal government, interviews with various officials, and field trips to government agencies. Vocational programs were instituted to show the boys and girls the opportunities in various communities. Many of the clubs inaugurated relief campaigns for the needy here and abroad.

Wellington, N. Z. (RNS) The Most Rev. Patrick F. Lyons, Roman Catholic Bishop of Christchurch, New Zealand, has been transferred to the Titular See of Carthage and appointed Auxiliary to Norman Cardinal Gilroy, Archbishop of Sydney, Australia, by Pope Pius XII. It was announced here.

Prior to his consecration as Bishop of Christchurch in 1944, Dr. Lyons was Vicar General of his native archdiocese of Melbourne, Australia.

Among Women

Ithaca Women Show The Way

The Mid-century White House Conference on Children and Youth which will convene in Washington, D. C., in December of this year will be of interest to all of us but particularly so to a group of Catholic women in Ithaca who have been organized in a Mrs. Snyder child study group for the past several years.

This club averages about thirty members and has monthly meetings at members' homes wherever possible. Because of the miniature homes and apartments some meetings must be held in the parish hall.

Miss James R. Bedford, who has been associated with the group since its inception acts as advisor and moderator. It has been the experience of the group that new mothers, although they are eager for guidance and instruction frequently do not have time to plan and carry through a sustained program so that the more experienced mothers render this

service and help the newer mothers. In preparation for the Mid-century Conference state leaders have been asked together to make plans for state and local participation. National organizations representing religion, labor, health, education, recreation and social welfare have been asked for suggestions and are now offering help in the development of the Conference.

It is at this point that a group of women who have prepared themselves by study and prayer can give great service to their church and their country. By study they are able to recognize problems in their own community, to report them intelligently and, if conditions warrant, to recommend action.

By expanding their study and co-ordinating their Church's answer to the community's questions regarding the child they are bringing light in dark places because the Church's answers are God's answers without which no lasting solution can be given for the problems of children and youth in this mid-century or any other time.

Italian Radio To Air Masses

Washington (AP) The Italian Radio will broadcast 33 of the best known Masses as its contribution to the Holy Year, the UNESCO World Review notes here. Compositions by Palestrina, Di Lasso, Gabrieli, Monteverdi, Scarlatti, Pergolesi, Cherubini, Rossini, Verdi, Puccini, and others will be presented on a world wide network.

Parish Sponsors Non-Profit Housing

Pittsburg, Mass. (RNS) A nonprofit housing project sponsored by parishioners of St. Anthony of Padua Roman Catholic church here is expected to provide homes for 15 families by next fall.

The development, believed to be the first of its kind in Massachusetts, eventually will include 60 houses. It is intended primarily for young couples of the parish anxious to buy homes at prices they can afford.

Each of the dwellings will have four finished rooms on the first floor and two unfinished rooms on the second. Houses with cellar will sell for \$6,000, including lot. Houses without cellar will be priced at \$5,000.

Berlin Catholics On Rome Pilgrimage

Berlin (RNS) Five hundred Berlin Roman Catholics, accompanied by Canon Georg Puchowski, left here on eight special buses on a Holy Year pilgrimage to Rome. Two thirds of the group were women.

Suffragan Bishop Paul Trosch of Berlin, who lives in the Soviet sector, was unable to take part in the pilgrimage because the Soviet authorities refused to give him a travel permit.
