St. Hyacinth Five Win In Church Bowling League

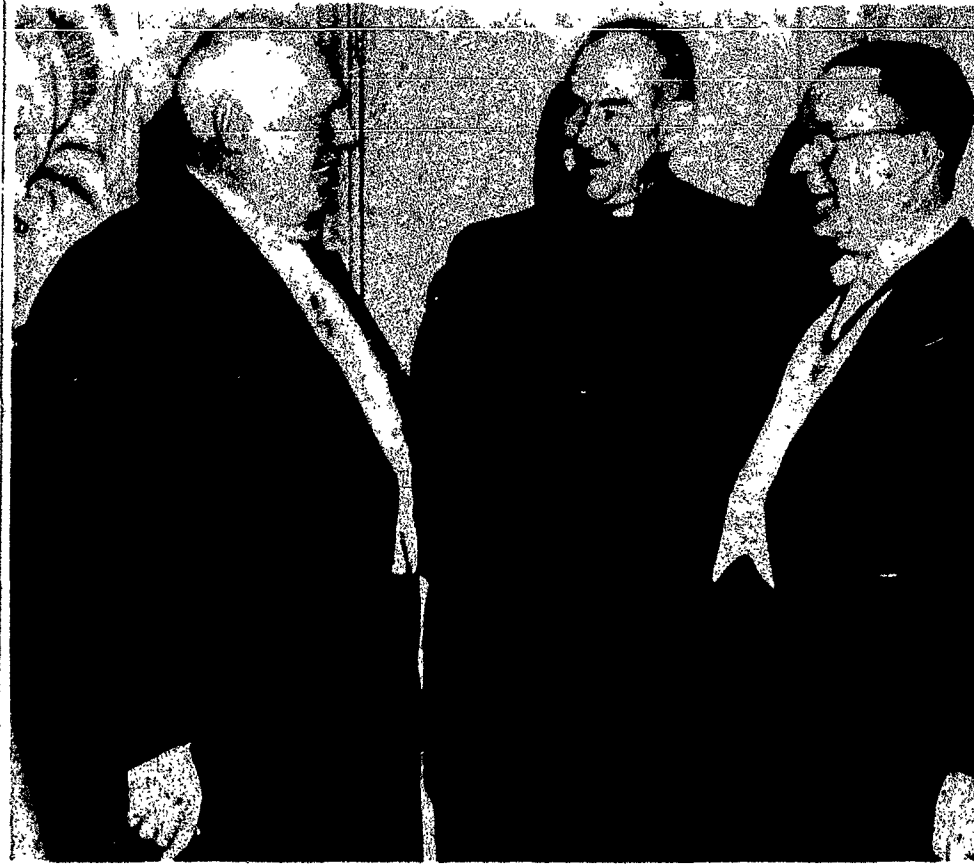
Auburn — The annual banquet of the Catholic Church Bowling League was held Wednesday evening April 12 at the Belvedere Restaurant.

Patriotism Stressed At KC 4th Degree Initiation

"Carry forward the ideals of Christianity in your personal lives as patriotic citizens." His Excellency Bishop Kearney told 125 candidates initiated into the Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus in an impressive ceremony in Columbus Civic Center ballroom, Sunday.

Supreme Director William E. Burke of Utica was prevented by illness from attending. In his place Jeremiah G. Hickey of Rochester, a Papal Knight, was called upon to speak. Mr. Hickey recalled being in the first class initiated in 1900 in New York City when the Fourth Degree was founded.

CANDIDATES WERE from Rochester, Corning, Seneca Falls, Elmira, Ithaca, Waterloo, Hornell, Waverly and Geneva.

In his address at the dinner the Bishop declared that the Catholic Church today is being challenged by enemies because she is sending into the world men trained to defend her in the war of ideas.

For many years the Bishop said, the church was engaged in building and operating things of mortar and steel institutions which are of help in the community. Now her sons and daughters are going forth in the world trained and determined to defend her ideas and ideals.

Supreme Master Mulligan as principal lay speaker declared that the Knights of Columbus order now in its 68th year, and the 50th year of the establishment of the Fourth Degree has 768,000 members.

Patriotism is the theme of the fourth degree he reminded the newly initiated "Patriotism and religion go hand in hand," he said, "and the stronger our religion is, the stronger will our patriotic feelings be."
