The annual report of the Catholic Agencies and Institutions of Rochester and Monroe County which participate in the Rochester Community Chest is one in which you can take just pride. In this report I would call your attention not so much to the numbers served by our various organizations but rather to the quality of work done by thoroughly qualified staffs in all fields of social endeavor—recreation, health, and family life.

St. Mary's Hospital in the field of health; St. Ann's Home for the care of the aged; St. Elizabeth's Guild House-for working girks and St. Joseph's Villa for dependent children are institutions which we can hold up as models in their respective fields.

The Columbus Youth Association, the Charles Settlement and the Genesee Settlement have made splendid progress in programs for Youth, especially in the development of an extended summer day camp program. A closer cooperation in the field of Scouting has shown results in the creation of new scout troops under Catholic auspices.

The Catholic Family Center of the Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Rochester, I believe, completed one of the finest service reports in the history of fis thirty-three years of service to Catholic people of Rochester. I say this because it now has the benefit of the best trained staff in all its history. The State Department of Welfare, you will recall, pointed out this fact in a letter to Your

Excellency on the condition of this Agency at the beginning of the year.


