

Well-Rounded Nazareth College Program Attracts Students from Around World

In its second quarter century of providing higher education for women, Rochester's Nazareth College is preparing to graduate its 23rd class in June this year. The Sisters of St. Joseph conduct the college.

From a humble beginning the Catholic college for women now located on East Avenue, Pittsford in one of the finest residential areas of the state is recognized internationally for its well-rounded program of Catholic cultural training. Students from as far away as China and Indo-China, from Alaska, Puerto Rico as well as many states have been attracted to this seat of learning.

With one of the most attractive campuses in the United States, Nazareth college consists of the administration building, the gymnasium, St. John Fisher residence hall and the lately acquired LePuy Senior Residence Hall.

The LePuy Residence Hall was named after the city in France in which the original Sisters of St. Joseph came into existence.

Library Noted

Nazareth College is noted for its development of recent



years and boasts of a library that is well-stocked and well managed under the direction of Sister M. Dominic who holds a degree in library science from the University of Michigan.

Liberal arts courses, courses in science, secretarial, social service, pre-medical, music, nursing, speech and drama



courses offer to young women the latest in training to fit them for modern callings.

Practical application of their training is worked out in practice training programs with the public high schools, in field work in social agencies for the sociology students, in the painting of murals of historical interests on the underground passage walls for the art students.

Members of the faculty, both religious and lay, are qualified with degrees, earned in this country and abroad, to impart knowledge in their classes.

Nursing Course

For young women seeking a career in nursing the college offers in connection with St. Joseph's Hospital of Elmira, an opportunity to acquire a bachelor of science in nursing education.

Equipment at the college for the teaching of music, science and other subjects is of the most modern attainable. Individual practice rooms are available.

Oldest Catholic university in the U.S. is Georgetown, founded in 1879. Catholic University in Washington was founded in 1869. Oldest Catholic college for women is the College of the Sacred Heart, Grand CotEAU, La., established in 1821.

The college carries on a well-rounded program of extra-curricular activities. The SPC (Society of Practical Culture) Dramatic Society is at present staging an original musical. The students issue their own publication "The Gleaner" and publish "Verily Fair," a cultural magazine as well as a year book.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney is chancellor of the college and Reverend Mother Rose Miriam is president.

Succeeding Sister M. Theresa Marie who was the first dean, is Sister M. Rose Angela who became dean in September 1949. Sister Theresa Marie



guided the college from its first class of 25 students down through the years. Today's enrollment is 426 students.

The college was founded in September, 1924 at the request of Bishop Thomas F. Hickey in the "Glass House" on Lake Ave. Rapid growth necessitated moving in 1928 to the building on Augustine St. now occupied by the Basilian Fathers. It was in 1941 that the college moved to its present site on East Ave. where progress has evidenced the need for the new college.

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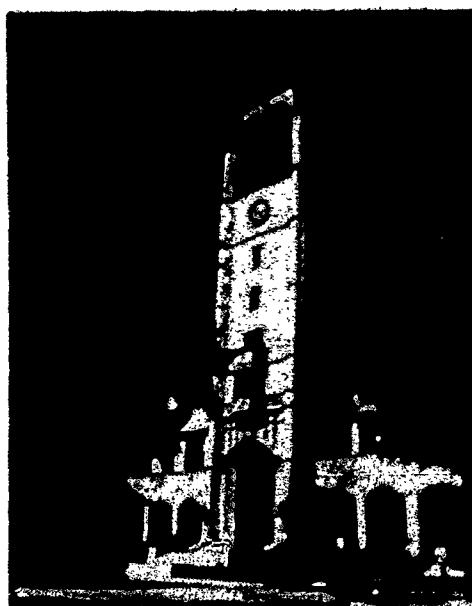
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
