## New St. Andrew's Seminary Will Open Next September

Definite plans are in the making to open the new million dollar St. Andrew's Seminary building on Buffalo Road in September according to the Rt. Rev. Magr. Edward M. Lyons, rector. The new building will replace the present structure used as a seminary on Plymouth Ave. North at Brown St.

All contracts for the new building have been let including those for altars, stained glass and other materials needed for the finished product. Joseph P. Flynn, architect, said this week.

With His Excellency Bishop Kearney officiating the cornerstone for the new 3-story building was laid on Nov. 30, 1949. The cornerstone laying was witnessed by an impressive

crowd of clergy seminarians and laity. The ceremony marked fulfillment of a project launched 20 years ago in a converted stable by Rochester's pioneer Bishop Bernard J. McQuaid.

Plans for the seminary call for a fireproof building with brick and limestone exterior when completed. On the basement level will be installed separate lockers, showers and toilets for high school and college students.

A two-story gymnasium and auditorium on the basement floor level will fill a need long felt by the seminary authorities. Monsignor Lyons and his staff will have administrative offices on the first floor. The chapel, faculty rooms, infirmary, parlors and kitchen will also be on the first floor.

High school classrooms and study hall will be on the second floor. The third floor will have a 100-capacity dormitory and two faculty suites. Linking the Diocese of Rochester in the new world with the Diocese over which the mar-

tyred Bishop, St. John Fisher presided, is a stone from St. Andrew's Cathedral, England, which rests in the cornerstone of the new seminary.

Besides the priest-alumni of St. Andrew's who are in various charges throughout the world, the St. Andrew's Lay Fraternity is taking a special interest in the new building. These laymen are conducting a campaign to purchase a statue of St. Joseph to grace the halls of their alma mater.
