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'Every Patient Is a Christ,' Archbp. Lucey Tells Nurses

Los Angeles — (NC) — "Every patient is a Christ." This is the truth which gives spiritual motivation to the Catholic nurse, Archbishop Robert E. Lucey of San Antonio told 500 delegates to the fifth biennial convention of the National Council of Catholic Nurses here.

Speaking on the theme of the convention, "Catholic Nursing: Our Heritage and Challenge," Archbishop Lucey told delegates from 60 American dioceses. "We are challenged to defend the kind of world which we have built over a period of 2,000 years of Christian history and to prove that we can build a better world than can the atheists."

"THE CHALLENGE to Catholic nurses today is organization and action under God, the Texas prelate said. "The Catholic nurse standing alone as an individual may sanctify herself and her home, but she cannot stop evil movements and vicious trends, who cannot build broadly and firmly Christian principles in nursing education and ethical standards in nursing service."

"Our Catholic nurses must be organized and active locally and nationally if they would bring this honored profession the truth, the nobility, the grandeur of Catholic nursing."

Our strength is spiritual, the San Antonio Archbishop continued, adding that "we can without apology plan a program for man, because we understand man."
