

Pentecost Novena Listed At St. Patrick Church

The public is invited to the nine-day special prayers described as aiming to have each person "draw into his own Cenacle" Upper Room, for prayer and penance following the advice of St. Paul: "Stir up in yourselves the grace that is in you by the laying on of hands" wherein he refers to Confirmation.

Police HNS Hears Cause Cited For Rise In Crime

Juvenile and adult criminality have "incubated fearfully" in the last few years because Americans have been "too busy" to bother with safeguarding morals and family life, members of the Rochester Police Department Holy Name Society were told Sunday.

Never in history has Christianity faced such powerful opposition as today, Robert K. Doran of Buffalo, editor of "The Victorian Magazine," declared at the annual Communion Breakfast of the Society in Hotel Seneca.

MORE THAN 200 bluecoats, detectives and county deputy sheriffs - largest attendance in the 13-year breakfast history - heard Doran warn that "there will be no greater cause for future catastrophe for Americans than the too-often repeated phrase 'I for one just haven't got time'."

Pointing to "multitudinous anti-Catholic, anti-Christian and anti-American organizations," to periodicals and books "dealing almost exclusively with bigotry against all Christianity and Jewry also" and to "publicists, writers and cracker-barrel orators who seem linked with the Devil himself," Doran asserted:

"We've all got another job to do besides that of making our daily bread. It is no longer possible for a loyal Christian American to come home from work eat supper and go to bed. As Catholics we must rise up to defend our church and our family and as Americans to defend our Declaration of Independence and the Four Freedoms against the tyranny pressing ever closer upon us."

Urging his listeners to "read your Catholic newspaper," Doran said: "I want to go on record as stating that your Catholic Courier Journal is one of the finest papers, Catholic or secular published in the United States and I'm a magazine man who is saying that."
