Show Force In Dealing With Reds Says General Howley In Aquinas Lecture

It is impossible to do business with the Reds unless you back up your position with an adequate evidence of force. In the opinion of a man who should know—Brig. Gen. Frank L. Howley, former director of military government in Berlin.

General Howley gave the closing address in the Christian Culture Lecture Series at Aquinas Institute May 5.

Answering a question, the dapper retired Army leader declared "WHY DON'T we get along with the Reds? Because they know what they want -- and we're in the way. They consider economic and political control vital to the success of their plan to engulf the world in Communism and will resort to any methods to gain that control."

Pointing out that in administering affairs in the American

sector of Berlin from July 1945 until last September he signed 1,300 agreements the General said

"Many of these they kept, but only because it was to their benefit to do so. When the Russians figured to gain through breaking a pact they did so without giving the matter a second thought."

"ONLY ONE HOPE remains to the Western democracies, the General continued. It is that, he emphasized, of convincing Russia that force will be met with force."

Failure of the United States to take action against Russia at the Paris conference which followed the Berlin blockade, the speaker declared, has given Russia confidence to make further economic threats. Calling Berlin the "show case" of the world so far as Communism is concerned, he said the city is "worth the price to use

on an offensive basis in facing up to our issues and principles. Europe, the General asserted, "is a continent of fear. Particularly do the people fear the ruthless brutality and cruelty of the Russian soldiers," and the recurring "kidnapping" tactics of the Russian secret police.

The Communists "are completely without a sense of truth or justice," General Howley continued. "They'll agree to take 60 per cent today -- and they'll be back for the other 40 per cent tomorrow."

ALTHOUGH NOT too optimistic at the present time, the General predicted that Communism never will succeed because it depends on force. "It is too dialectic in its principles," he added "ruling out emotional appeal. There is no deviation which takes into account human nature. Commun-
