KC State Unit Reports Hospital For TB Improved

Accommodations for 22 additional beds have been made available with completion of renovations and repairs on both Knights of Columbus buildings at Sanatorium in Buffalo, N.Y. members of the order have been informed here.

The Knights of Columbus Hospital Association of the State of New York supervised the activity of the State K of C in the care of its members afflicted with pulmonary tuberculosis and controls the ten buildings and sanatorium operated by the Sisters of Mercy.

Annual meetings of the Corporation and Board of Directors was held May 7 and Past State Hugh A. Doyle of New Rochelle was re-elected president of the Association along with other officers.

THE BOARD inspected the improvements and President Doyle stated that the New York Knights have expended more than three quarters of a million dollars for care and maintenance of 400 members afflicted with pulmonary tuberculosis since the State Legislature passed a special law incorporating the Association in 1926.

Doyle reported that plans have been completed for visitation of the delegates and visitors to the New York State Convention in Lake Placid on May 26 and 27.
