The center, located in the school basement, is the result of months of labor on the part of parishioners who donated their services to transform the old basement into the modern recreation rooms available to the school and the parish.

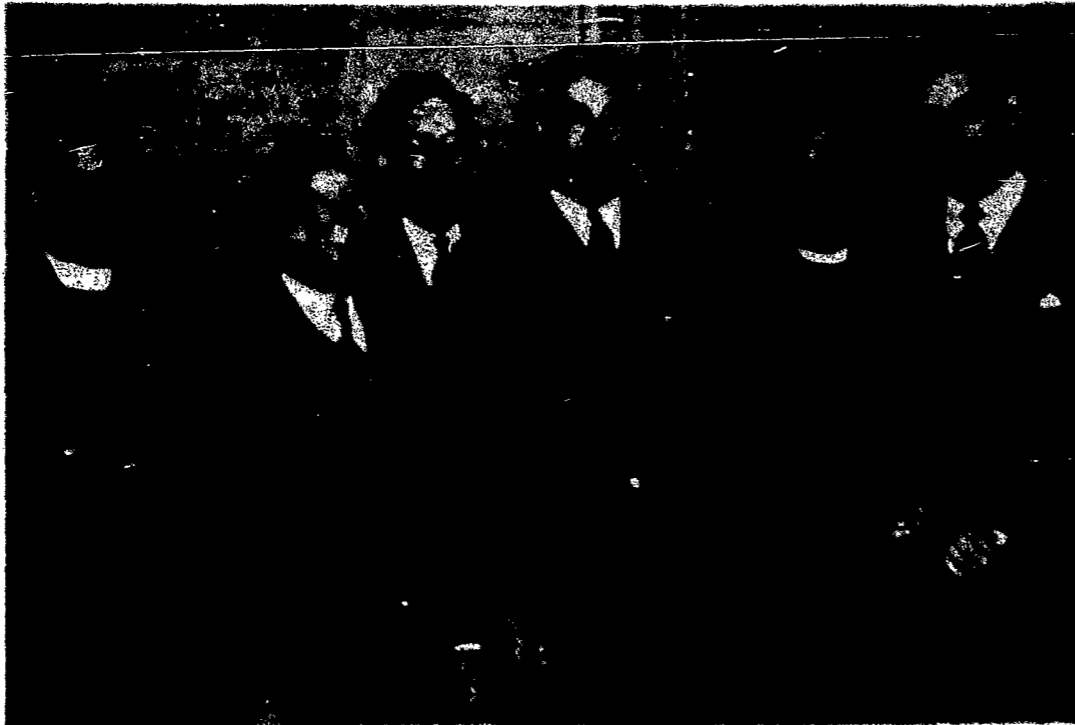
Girl Scouts Slate Breakfast, Sunday

Match Communist Zeal, H. N. Men Told By Priest

A warning against the indifference and complacency shown by some Catholics was sounded by the Rev. John B. Affleck, O.P. of New York City, assistant national director of Holy Name Societies speaking at the Mark Twain Hotel, Elmira.

Father Affleck was principal speaker at a special Mother's Day Communion Breakfast attended by several hundred Elmira Catholics.

The breakfast was sponsored by the Holy Name Societies of St. Patrick's and St. Mary's Churches, Elmira.

FATHER AFFLECK criticized the passive attitude of some Catholics with the reputation of Communist Party workers who put forth tireless effort in support of their program and ideals.

The Holy Name director urged the assembly to stop "letting George do it" and asked them to get out and protest openly against subversive activities that exist within their communities.

Prior to the breakfast, the members received Holy Communion in a body at their respective churches.

Mass, Dinner Highlight H. N. Union Meet Sunday

"Freedom is a Fighting Word" is the title of an address to be given by the Rev. Richard Torrey at a dinner at 11:30 p.m. Sunday, May 21, highlighting the 15th annual convention of the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union.

The challenge facing Catholics today will be outlined in the special message to Holy Name men by Father Torrey, associate editor of the Catholic Courier Journal and director of the "Courier Journal of the Air" program each Sunday noon over Station WJAM.

More than 300 Holy Name men from parishes throughout the diocese will attend the convention, which Diocesan Union President Daniel E. Macken describes as "one of the most important in our history."

Macken pointed out that for the first time the convention program is being expanded to allow for fuller discussion during the business session.

The Rev. Patrick J. Flynn, editor of the Catholic Courier Journal and spiritual director of the Diocesan Holy Name Union, will

celebrate Mass in the Aquinas auditorium at 11:30 a.m. Delegates and visitors also will gather in the school cafeteria for the convention dinner, which will be a full-course meal served by a caterer.

Following Father Torrey's address the men will assemble in the auditorium, where the business session will be conducted with President Macken presiding.

OF PARTICULAR interest during the business session will be a proposed constitutional amendment recommended for introduction by the Union's executive committee. Macken has urged all delegates to be prepared to vote on this important amendment.

To be reviewed will be details of the several Holy Name activities during the last year, including the Holy Name sponsored by the Union last fall in St. Vincent's school and the "City of Hope" play recently presented in Henry Auditorium.

Holy Name men throughout the diocese have been asked to attend the convention. Such parish societies as entitled to the official representation—spiritual director, president, secretary and two delegates, but all other Holy Name men are urged to be present.
