

Mass, Dinner Highlight H. N. Union Meet Sunday

"Freedom is a Fighting Word" is the title of an address to be given by the Rev. Richard Tormey at a dinner at 12:30 p.m. Sunday, May 21, highlighting the 13th annual convention of the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union.

The challenge facing Catholic men today will be outlined in the special message to Holy Name men by Father Tormey, associate editor of the Catholic Courier Journal and director of the "Counter Journal" program each Sunday noon over Station WJAM.

Father Tormey is widely known in the diocese for his excellence in his radio presentations, in which he discusses "The Moral Behind the Headlines."

MORE THAN 300 Holy Name men from parishes throughout the diocese will attend the convention, which Diocesan Union President Daniel E. Macken describes as "one of the most important in our history."

Macken pointed out that for the first time the convention program is being expanded, to allow for fuller discussion during the business session.

The Rev. Patrick J. Flynn, editor of the Catholic Courier Journal and spiritual director of the Diocesan Holy Name Union, will celebrate Mass in the Aquinas auditorium at 11:30 a.m. Delegates and visitors then will gather in the school cafeteria for the convention dinner, which will be a full-course meal served by a caterer.

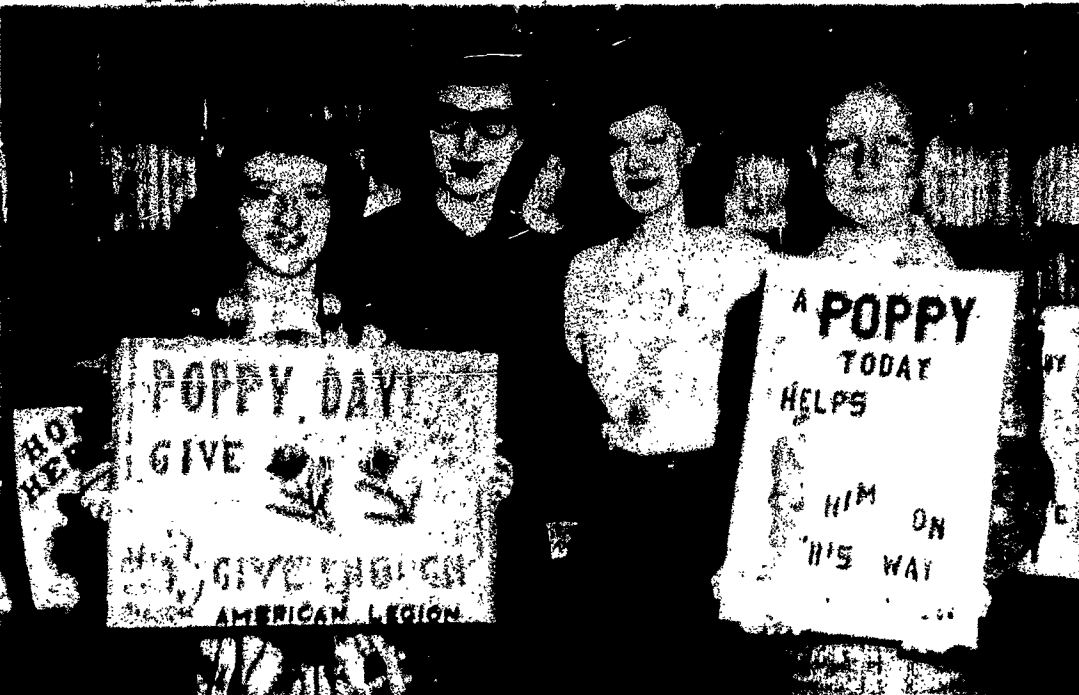
Following Father Tormey's address the men will assemble in the auditorium, where the business session will be conducted with President Macken presiding.

OF PARTICULAR import during the business session will be a proposed constitutional amendment recommended for introduction by the Union's executive committee. Macken has urged all delegates to be prepared to vote on this important amendment.

To be reviewed will be details of the several Holy Name activities during the last year, including the Holy Hour conducted by the Union last fall in Red Wing stadium and the "City of Kings" play recently sponsored in Mercy Auditorium.

Holy Name men throughout the diocese have been called on to attend the convention. Each parish society is entitled to five official representatives—spiritual director, president, secretary and two delegates, but all other Holy Name men are urged to be present.

Teach Discipline In Infancy Urges Doctor McHugh

Geneva — Discipline of children should be started when they are infants if they are to be brought up as law abiding citizens, Dr. Hugh McHugh, psychiatrist connected with U. S. Veterans' hospital, Canandaigua, told parishioners of St. Francis de Sales parish Sunday.

Dr. McHugh spoke before 200 members of the society at their annual Communion breakfast in the school. On the subject of "Psychiatry from the Catholic Viewpoint," Dr. McHugh said that many psychiatric cases are being released from the hospitals and that many more could be if relatives and friends were more tolerant and understanding.

Responsibility for upbringing of children, which should be a cooperative one between father and mother, has shifted to the mother because fathers are engaged in keener business competition and a multiplicity of activities they seem to have lost time for interest in their youngsters, the psychiatrist said.

Mrs. Howard Groden was toastmistress. Central feature of the decorations was a shrine in honor of the Blessed Mother. Cut Spring flowers and lighted tapers also were used.

Invocation was given by the moderator, Rev. Vincent Collins.

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\$300,000 School, Convent Additions Rise In Greece

Children of St. Charles Borromeo parish, Greece, winding up the final month in their crowded school this week proudly watched rapid construction of the new \$300,000 buildings which will be their school and convent when they open the September session.

Facing Devol Avenue, just north of the Stone Rd., the bright new parish property is a continuation of the present school on Maiden Lane. Nearly two-thirds completed, it will be ready for total occupancy September 1.

ONE STORY high and 175 feet long, the fireproof school building is completely modern in every detail. It will add six new classrooms and two kindergartens to the present facilities, the Rev. A. Keeler, pastor revealed.

The old school has 8 classrooms and uses 3 rooms in an annex building nearby. These will be retained, Father Keeler said.

"Even with the additional space of this new building," he said, "we expect to need all the rooms. There are 94 children already registered for next Fall's kindergarten."

Beside the school, the Sisters' convent is getting a much-needed enlargement. A 3-story addition will provide more living space for the present faculty of 17 Sisters of Mercy and the four new Sisters who will come to St. Charles in the Fall.

A parish hall is being built.
