British Mother Asks State Promote Children's Films

London — An international pool of children's films is recommended by the Honorable Mrs. Henrietta Bower, former national president of Britain's Union of Catholic Mothers, as the answer to the problem of child attendance at motion pic- tures.
Mrs. Bower, only Catholic member of a government appoint- ed committee to study the prob- lem, made the headlines with her remarks on the subject dissem- inated from certain aspects of its general report.
"MOVION PICTURES can be a great power for good," she says in her memorandum attached to the committee's report. "It can most effectively convey ideas of truth, goodness and beauty. For these reasons I attach tremen- dous importance to the recom- mendation that funds be made available to ensure the continued production in this country of special films for children."

"I would also recommend that an international pool of children's films, consisting of films made especially for children and of those adapted for children in the United States, and elsewhere, be established."
Mrs. Bower, mother of eight children, said, "The motion picture has a greater power to pro- voke a child to imitation, and an almost uncanny power of mak- ing the unreal appear real. There has been considerable evidence that many children up to nine or ten think that the film is real."
Mrs. Bower refuses to accept the committee's general finding that films are not primarily re- sponsible for the delinquency or moral laxity of children under 16 and that deeper, subtler and more various influences are at work.
"WHILE THE motion picture is not proved a major direct cause of juvenile delinquency," she adds, "the conclusion is in- escapable that it is an important contributory cause, particularly where picture-going is excessive."
"My colleagues accept that the regular portrayal of false values (in films) is more per- nicious and dangerous than the depiction of crime or immor- ality."

NBC To Air Mass For War-Dead

Washington, May 25 — More than 10,000 persons from 200 parishes in the Archdiocese of Washington and the Diocese of Wheeling will attend the 12th annual Mass for the War-Dead at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception on May 26.
A broadcast program of the ceremony will be transmitted nationwide from 11:30 to 11:45 a.m. over NBC network and WHEA, Washington. The broadcast will feature the sermon by Father O'Connell and a portion of the Mass.
Representatives from more than 100 National and foreign organizations will assist at the Mass and after the ceremony each will lay a wreath in the name of the Christian nation.

Movie of Pope's Daily Work To Be Shown Here, June 5-6

Rochesterians who can't go to Rome will be offered a kind of Holy Year pilgrimage-at-home by the IRO Temple Theater which will bring "The Story of the Pope," to its screen Monday and Tuesday June 5 and 6.
For the parochial school Sis- ters, a special showing is also planned by the Temple Saturday morning June 3. Special discount tickets are being made available for children for both matinee and evening performances on Satur- day.
A 30-MINUTE documentary, "The Story of the Pope," pre- sents a detailed view of the Vat- ican, its personalities, its admin- istrative work, art treasures, and a biography of the reigning Pon- tiff, with a sketch of his duties and daily routine.
His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman introduces the film, and the narration is taken up by the Rt. Rev. Magr. Fulton J. Sheen. Commentary was written by John Mehall, in collaboration with the Rev. John O'Connor.
This is the American version of "Pastor Angelicus," produced in 1942 in Italy by Centro Cat- olico Cinematografico. An im- portant addition to the original film is a portion made up of newsreel clips from shots taken at the Vatican Consistory in 1936 when Cardinal Spellman and three other Americans re- ceived the red hat from the
