"Russia does not want a hot war but father wishes to take over this country by working within, thus saving the great productive power of this nation for the Soviet Union."

An Congressman from the 40th District, O'Brien said he visited Russia and many manifestations of the armed forces at the request of President Roosevelt. He described our nation's activities in Alaska during the war and the many hazards of a plane test in that section.

MacSweeney Named Head of Legal Aid For 19th Term

Joseph P. MacSweeney was re-elected president for the 19th term of the Legal Aid Society at the annual meeting 25 Exchange St. May 22.

Sincere appreciation of the entire board to Mr. MacSweeney for his continual keen interest and unusual endeavor on behalf of the society was expressed by former City Court Judge Jacob Giehlman, chairman of the nominating committee.

Mr. MacSweeney, advertising and public relations consultant for the Rochester Gas and Electric Corporation, has served as director and officer of the Society since its incorporation in 1921.

Benjamin E. Selm, Executive Attorney, reported that the Legal Aid Society handled 305 cases during the year 1949-50. That the agency looked forward with great interest in the coming year due to the recent enactment into law of the amended City Court Act which embraces the Small Claims Court.

That the instrumentality of the Legal Aid Society and more particularly the services rendered by Emory A. Brownell and Vascan in laying the ground work for the inclusion of the Small Claims Court in the amended City Court Act was but an example of the continual effort of those associated with the Legal Aid Society to constantly improve legal services rendered to indigent people.

He continued by pointing out that although much work remains to be done changing time and circumstances necessitate the continual alertness to the need not only of our community but the recognition by us of our responsibility.
