

Family Rosary Outdoors Set For WSAY Broadcasts

An outdoors broadcast of the Family Rosary for Peace at the Shrine of Our Lady of the Rosary on Orange Street is expected to swell the crowds who nightly recite the rosary on WSAY. Now in its fourth month on every-night broadcasting, the Rosary program claims a wide audience of listeners of every faith.

Beginning this Sunday evening at 10 p. m. and each night thereafter, weather permitting, the Rosary prayers will be aired from the Shrine on the parish grounds of St. Francis of Assisi Church. The public is cordially invited. According to the Family Rosary Guild who sponsor the nightly program and no tickets will be required hereafter to participate in the broadcast.

The parish grounds will accommodate several hundred people standing near the microphones at the shrine and loudspeakers will be installed on the property to carry the prayers to those who gather on the sidewalks along Orange Street and Whitney Street. The program is broadcast at 10 p. m. Sunday through Friday and 10:30 p. m. on Saturday.

THE REGULAR PLAN of involving laymen and parish of family groups to take a leading part in the recitation of the Rosary will continue, the Guild announced, but there will be no restriction on the number of those who may attend.

The Holy Name Society of St. Charles Borromeo parish and the Boy Scout Troop of St. John the Evangelist parish, Greece, will take leading roles in the broadcasts of the Family Rosary for Peace this week.

The St. Charles men led by Pierre Helland will recite the prayers on Thursday, June 1, and the Scouts will assist in the program on Monday evening, May 29.

Mercy Killing Hit At State CD Convention

Delegates from more than 200 units of New York State Court, Catholic Daughters of America, meeting last week in Syracuse, N. Y. for their 22nd biennial convention, protested the continued imprisonment of Cardinal Mindszenty and assailed euthanasia, or mercy killings, and any form of legislation tending to advocate them.

Acting on resolutions on the second day of the convention in Hotel Syracuse the representatives voted to send a petition to President Truman asking him to demand that the Hungarian government release the Cardinal.

AMONG HIGHLIGHTS of the three-day meeting was the presentation to Miss Marie C. Curran of Bellerose, L. I., state regent and national director of the CDA, of the Pápal Cross — Pro Ecclesia Pontifici, by the Most Rev. Stephen J. Donahue, auxiliary bishop of New York and state court chaplain. The honor for her services to the Church came from Rome through His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman of New York.

Miss Curran who has been affiliated with the Catholic Daughters more than 30 years, was re-elected for another two-year term at the convention. She was also presented her passage for a Holy Year pilgrimage to Rome in a group led by Bishop Donahue.

State officers also re-elected by the convention were Mrs. Margaret D. Lario of Chateaugay, state regent; Miss Elizabeth M. Walsh of Cohoes, treasurer; Mrs. Mary D. Harrington of Dunkirk, secretary; and Mrs. Jane Benning of Mount Vernon, monitor.

ANN SHEEHAN of Waverly was chosen as a delegate to attend the national convention July 10 at Asheville, N. C.

Among 16 new junior courts added to the state CDA, according to Mrs. Margaret McKearney, state junior chairman, was one in Oneida.

Court representatives began the convention Tuesday morning by attending a pontifical High Mass celebrated by the Most Rev. Walter A. Foery, bishop of Syracuse in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception.
