Bishop Encourages Canvass For Red Cross Blood Donors

House-to-house canvass in Rochester and Monroe County now being conducted by the Rochester Chapter of the Red Cross is being given the encouragement of His Excellency Bishop Kearney, this week.

The canvass has a two-fold purpose according to Rochester Chapter leaders.

1. To tell over, adult what the Blood Program is accomplishing for community health, and to explain to him his responsibility for its continuing success.

2. To enroll every possible adult from 18 to 59 as a Sustaining Blood Donor (one who is willing to be approached at least once a year for a blood donation).

The Rochester Regional Red Cross Blood Program has met the need of every blood requirement in the area since it was inaugurated, Jan. 12, 1948, the Chapter spokesmen state.

"We feel" the announcement said, "that too small a number of our citizens has been carrying the responsibility up to the present time, and that we need to interest a greater number in blood donations."

The campaign will be continued until June 13.

Ex-Rochester Attorney Gets Degree at 74

New Orleans (AP) — Among the 381 graduates to receive degrees from Loyola University of the South at the Municipal Auditorium here was 74-year-old Claude Terry Taggart, who was graduated in law.



However, a law degree is nothing new for Mr. Taggart. In 1900 he received a law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, three years after being graduated from that university's college of business and finance.

Then he worked in law of firms in Rochester, N. Y., and had his own practice there for 31 years. He married a New Orleans girl who sang professionally under the name of "Madame Castellan." Mrs. Taggart is still a singer and teacher of voice.

(In Rochester the Taggartis were members of Blessed Sacrament parish and lived for many years on Alexander St. Because of Mr. Taggart's health they moved to New Orleans in 1947.)

Since Louisiana follows the Napoleonic Code, and Mr. Taggart's experience was in common law, he had to go again to college before being eligible for the State bar examination.

One day on his way to class Mr. Taggart received a slap on the back and a greeting "Hya Pop." The slapper was a freshman calling you "Pop," he said. "Not at all," the 74-year-old freshman said, "not as long as you don't call me 'Grandpop'."

During part of his course at Loyola, Mr. Taggart took typing and bookkeeping at Soule College, a business school Mr. Taggart has found attending a school a rejuvenating experience.

Drive Inaugurated in Geneva For New \$100,000 Gymnasium

Geneva — De Sales High school will have a \$100,000 gymnasium in addition to a new wing which is now being built on the Putney St. section of the school. Funds for the new gym will be secured through a drive opening Sunday, June 18, by St. Stephen's and St. Francis de Sales parishes, jointly operating the school.

Announcement of the projected plans for the building of the gym were made Friday in both parishes. Pledge cards are being prepared, workers are being organized into teams, and every thing is being readied for the drive.

OBJECTIVE WILL be the collection of \$50,000 each from both parishes for a \$100,000 project.

Already well into one building program, to replace a section destroyed by fire, the parishes hope to have the present addition completed by the opening of school next fall.

Because of fine weather, the contractors are about two or three weeks ahead of schedule on the new wing. It will house a room, a library, laboratory, lunch room, and showers. It will replace a large wing destroyed by fire on Mar. 23, 1943.

While present quarters have been cramped for the students and faculty, academic work has been progressing satisfactorily, but physical activities have had to be curtailed.

PRESSING NEED for a new gym has been voiced on all sides. As a result, school officials in a meeting a few weeks ago, decided that now is the opportune time to fulfill the desire of the parishes for a gym for the students.
