

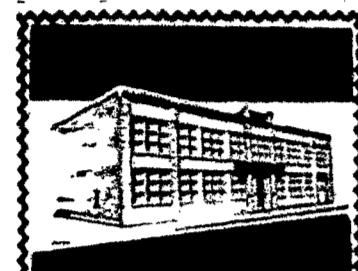
### Pope Blesses New Altar In St. Peter's Hidden Crypt

Vatican City — (NC) — His Holiness Pope Pius XII this week consecrated the new altar of St. Peter which, like the previous one, has been erected in the Cappella Clementina of the restored crypt under the floor of St. Peter's Basilica.

The ceremony was private. Only persons of the immediate papal household attended the consecration and the Mass the Pope offered there after the ceremony.

Later the Holy Father received the architects attached to the Sacred Congregation of the Basilica of St. Peter and the members of the archaeological commission in charge of excavations under St. Peter's during the past ten years.

Father then went through the crypt on an inspection tour conducted by Magr. Ludwig Kaas, secretary of the Congregation for St. Peter's. The Pope paused at the tombs of his predecessors, Popes Benedict XX and Pius XI, and Cardinal Merry del Val, English-born prelate who was Prefect of the Congregation for St. Peter's at the time of his death in 1930.

The new crypt has nine altars, two of which are still unblessed: St. Anne and St. Columban's.

There is no word yet whether the public will be admitted to the new crypt. There is likewise no word yet on the results of the excavations, but some reports say that the findings of the archeologists may not be published for several more months. It has been surmised that the burial place of St. Peter and his bones have been positively identified here.

### Anti-Religion Forces Attacked By Abp. Cushing

Winnond Park, Vt. — (NC) — The phrase, "This nation under God" was made famous by Abraham Lincoln, soon being known as "the nation without God," if the United States Court renders more decisions like that in the McCollum case, Archbishop Richard J. Cushing of Boston, told graduates at commencement exercises of St. Michael's College here.

The Boston prelate told the graduates that Lincoln's "aid not speak of America as infidel or secular terms, nor in sufficient, merely civic terms."

HE DECLARED that when Lincoln spoke of the country as "This nation under God" the Civil War president realized that "no nation achieves greatness apart from God's will and no nation retains its greatness which violates that will or forgets its God."

"The McCollum decision," the Bishop declared, "has brought comfort and courage to those who would keep God and religion from the classroom and prepare the way for the freedom of anti-religious indoctrination. Such trends, and many others like them, will not keep 'This nation under God' but if they continue they will keep 'The nation without God.'"

The doctrine of "This nation under God" the Archbishop said, was acknowledged by George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, John and John Quincy Adams, James Madison, James Monroe, John Tyler, Andrew Jackson, Franklin Pierce, Woodrow Wilson and many other Presidents, and he quoted public remarks made by these presidents in support of the doctrine.

"We have a sublime destiny," the Archbishop said, "and it is nothing less than to be attained if only we are as a nation united in God's will. We are not a mere political society, not an economic society, not a social society, but a nation under God."
