

### French Queen Canonized In Holy Year Rite

Vatican — (NC) — The rejected daughter of one French King and the wife of another in an example of saintly patience for a world striving for peace, His Holiness Pope Pius XII declared at the solemn canonization of St. Jeanne of Valois, foundress of the Sisters of Annunciate.

In a Latin homily heard by 55,000 crowding St. Peter's and broadcast to many countries, the Holy Father declared that the life of the new Saint gives the world these exhortations: extinguish hatreds, love one another, solve dissension through justice and charity, calm discord and form one great family striving toward universal prosperity and peace.

"MAY MEN learn from St. Jeanne that neither earthly greatness, nor riches, nor the joys of the world bring happiness, but that it comes only from virtue and holiness," the Pontiff declared.

Among those witnessing the splendor of the canonization ceremony, the fourth of this Holy Year, were an estimated 30,000 French members of the national pilgrimage led by His Eminence Achille Cardinal Lienart, Bishop of Lille and dean of the French Hierarchy. The pilgrimage included 30 Archbishops, among them Archbishop Maurice Felin of Paris.

The new Saint was born April 23, 1464, in the castle of Pleissis les Tours, daughter of Louis XI, King of France, and Queen Charlotte. She grew up in loneliness in care of a governess.

AT THE age of 12 the child was forced, in accordance with the custom of those days, to enter into marriage with her 14-year-old cousin, Louis, Duke of Orleans, who already had a deep aversion toward the girl. The marriage had been arranged by her father to further his political ambitions. Her married life was one of utmost misery as her husband deserted her.

When Charles VIII died in 1498 without leaving an heir, Jeanne's husband was crowned King of France, taking the name of Louis XII.

The first thing he did was to free himself from Jeanne. He disputed the validity of their marriage, asserting it had been contracted under compulsion of the despotic Louis XI. After the marriage had been declared void by a tribunal set up by Pope Alexander VI, Jeanne retired without any regrets and devoted herself wholly to promoting the good of her people and perfecting herself in virtue.

She became one of the first promoters of devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, which appeared to her in a vision. Jeanne died on February 4, 1565, at the age of 41.

### Honor Jewish Professor At Jesuit School

New York — (NC) — A Russian-Jewish professor is one of the reasons why the Jesuits' Saint Louis University has "one of the best courses of study in commerce in the country," according to an article in Collier's Magazine, published this week.

Subject of the article, entitled "Well Done, Sir," is Prof. Gustav Kadysh Klausner, in whose honor St. Louis businessmen established a \$250,000 endowed professorship early this year. A fugitive from the Russian pogroms under the czar, he was graduated from Saint Louis University's first commerce class and has spent 40 years as student and teacher at the university.

Forty-four of the commerce school's faculty have studied under Prof. Klausner. According to the article, he and the late Father Joseph L. Davis, S.J., organizer and first regent, built the Commerce School together.

"The professor believes that no man Jew, Catholic or Protestant, should falter in his religion," the Collier's article reports. "Go to Mass," he would urge his predominantly Catholic classes, "or you will all turn out to be Bolsheviks!"

### 50,000,000 Catholics Now Under Red Rule In Europe

Munich — (NC) — Nearly 50,000,000 Catholics are now under the brutal sway of the Soviet regime and its satellite and puppet states in Europe, according to a survey of Christian-Nachrichtendienst, a religious news service here. The figures follow:

In addition there are at least 1,000,000 Catholics in the Baltic countries of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia, which have been annexed by Russia.

Another type of war — tragically complicated the European scene further — the many millions of Catholics expelled forcibly from their homes in Eastern Europe as a result of the war. According to latest figures some 3,000,000 Catholics came from those districts and are now residing in territories formerly predominantly Protestant. In the whole German "dispersa" there are now 6,200,000 Catholics among 40,000,000 million Protestants.

The shortage of clergy and the extreme poverty of the majority of these people are a cause of serious and constant concern to the Church authorities.

### Holy Land Demands Kill Peace Hopes

Lake Success, N.Y. — (NC) — Implementation of the United Nations statute for an international Jerusalem "would seem to be seriously compromised under present conditions," Roger Carreau told the U.N. Trusteeship Council in reporting on his efforts to confer with Israel and Jordan on approval of the statute to put the Holy City under international rule.

The Council agreed to postpone until June 12 its discussion of plans for U.N. control of Jerusalem.

In April, when he was serving as president of the Trusteeship Council, the council instructed Mr. Carreau to transmit the statute's text to the two governments and to request their full cooperation.

No answer has been received from the government of Jordan.

THE ISRAELI memorandum says the population is unacceptably opposed to internationalization, that the implementation of the statute would mean political disintegration and economic strangulation of the area, and that the General Assembly has no legal right under the U.N. Charter to impose its administrative and executive control over Jerusalem.

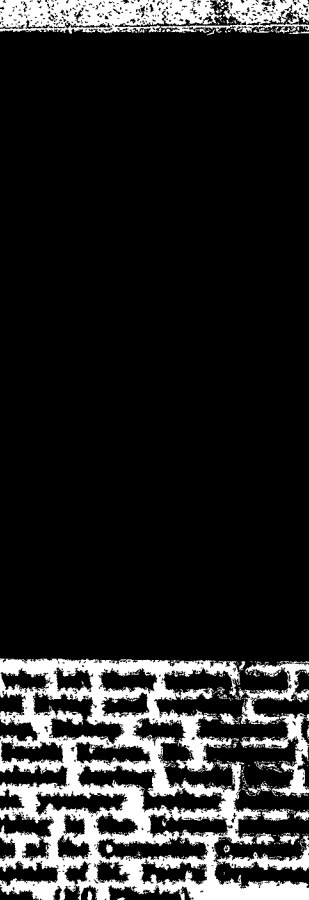
Israel offers an alternative proposal for control of the Holy Places. It calls for protection of the Holy Places, assurance of facilities for access and pilgrimage, maintenance of the religious life revolving around the Holy Places. All this would be under direct United Nations control by virtue of a statute which, however, would confine U.N. jurisdiction to the Holy Places alone.

THE PRESENT memorandum also states that Israel is ready to cooperate in creation of an international regime for a limited area of one and one-half square miles within the walled city and its immediate environs, on the basis that nearly all the Holy Places are located within that area. This is the first concession of any kind officially made by Israel.

Meanwhile, there is no indication that the Holy See has changed its view that a real internationalization such as that envisaged by the General Assembly is the only sure safeguard for the Holy City and its Holy Places, considering the dubious and uneasy peace now existing between Israelis and Arabs in Palestine.

The present silence of Jordan merely confirms its categorical statement to the last session of the Council that it will accept no form of internationalization.

### Bishop, Two Missionaries In Korea Mark Golden Jubilee

Seoul, Korea — (NC) — Fifty years ago, six young newly-ordained missionary priests of the Paris Foreign Missions Society left their native France and set out for Korea to serve as missionaries. Today three of them are still alive and still working among the Koreans. The three are Bishop Jean Mounset and the Revs. Antoine and Julien Gambert. The first became Bishop and Apostolic Vicar of Taku in 1908. He resigned in favor of a Japanese Bishop appointed during World War II and returned to France. After a year's stay in Paris, he returned to Korea and resumed his missionary duties under the present Vicar Apostolic of Taku, Bishop John Cho.
