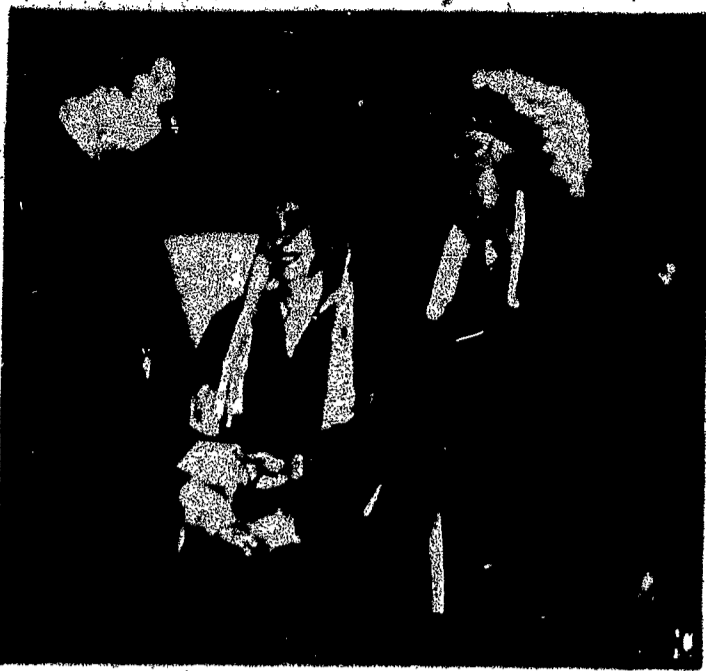

Msgr. Sheen Preaches In Rome

Rome — (NC) — Close to a thousand Americans — priests, laymen, women and child in the United States, each in his own faith, to seek divine guidance and assistance in securing world peace.

Washington — (NC) — Con-servative Brown, syndicated for- eign affairs analyst, has paid tribute in one of his columns to the daily prayer for peace move- ment instituted by Harvey J. L'Heureux, chief of the State De- partment's visa division.

Noting the appeal of L'Heu- reux's idea with its "simplicity" and "all-embracing character," Brown devoted an entire column to describing the rapid spread of the movement to its present "vast proportions," and to a statement by the author of the movement's aims.

L'Heureux's proposal is for "a minimum of one minute of prayer daily at noon by every man, woman and child in the United States, each in his own faith, to seek divine guidance and assistance in securing world peace."

DIPLomat URGES Unity Of Moral Forces Against Foes Of Freedom

(Continued from Page 1) been the personal representative to the Vatican of the late Presi- dent Roosevelt and President Truman. The 76-year-old Episco- palian resigned the post last January.

Addressing the final lunch- eon gathering Sunday, Bishop Kenney told the student de- legates they are leaders in the spreading of religious ideals. He urged them to carry their responsibility to their campus- es and to pledge "that Christ will not walk the campus alone."

In receiving the specially de- signed medal Taylor said he ac- cepted it "as an honor bestowed in encouragement of the great Cause to which I have increasing- ly devoted such abilities as were mine especially during the past 10 or more years, as the chal- lenge from the powers inimical to God and human liberty has become unmistakable and decis- ive."

LAUDING the works of the Cardinal for whom the award is named, Taylor said: "He had to argue, almost a cen- tury ago that the study of religion is needed in universities side by side with education in the sciences and literature. We to- day have been made sharply aware by the events of our own era that intellectual excellence is indeed not enough by itself alone. Without moral courage and vi- sion without the impulse of faith, the men and women from whom mankind expects and receives so much of leadership must of ne- cessity be limited in helping the free world to pass safely through the enveloping crisis of these hazardous times."

At bottom, Taylor said, this is a period in which the moral val- ues inseparable from religion — the values that are at the heart of freedom are at stake. Moral values are the foundation of the strength of every nation in which the dynamic principles of free- dom prevail, he said adding:

"IT IS THESE values these precious wellsprings of progress which the moral forces of the world hold in trust and for which they must speak and act."

Foremost among those kin- dred interests is freedom of con- science and worship. All others are endangered if this freedom be impaired. Every moral force derives inspiration in final an- alysis, from religion."

To sex confusion and dissen- sion among the moral forces in divide their strength, and there- by weaken the free world is the first objective of the totalitarian attack now under way, Tay- lor said.

"All our hopes for develop- ment of a better world founded upon morality and justice depend upon the response made by the moral forces to this challenge. I can avail free men and women little to have vast material re- sources and military power if there is among them little con- viction that the issues now en- gaging them are fundamentally moral in character. If the com- mon purposes and interests among moral forces everywhere will lead them to combine their

resources of determination and purpose, no jeopardy however threatening can prevail against them singly or as a whole.

"IT IS ONLY in the dire event that men of good will would dis- regard the common ties existing among them despite differences of outlook and of practices — whether of religious, economic, political or other character — and would fail to join their ef- forts in behalf of their mutual wellbeing that present dangers can prove overwhelming.

"It has been my heart-felt privilege to have worked in re- cent years directly with leaders of many religious faiths in var- ious parts of the globe and with leaders in official quarters, all of whom are daily concerned with the tasks of moral leader- ship. My own conception of these urgent and far-reaching tasks has been enriched by these as- sociations. It has been an inspir- ing experience for me to observe the steadfast vision and courage with which Pope Pius XII and President Truman — as Presi- dent Roosevelt before him — have sought to advance the world con- ditions necessary for creation of true peace.

"So long as the sense of moral duty lies deep in the character untold millions of people in all walks of life in our own and other lands, progress, wellbeing and genuine peace are possible. But they are not inevitable or automatic. They can be assured only as all moral forces all re- ligious faiths strike effectively co-operatively and with the strength of unity on the issues vital to them all to preserve the values of freedom for mankind."

UN Aide Urges Need Of Parental Training
Lake Success, N. Y. — (NC) — The need to convince public opin- ion that the role of a wife and mother requires a high degree of education and training was stressed by the representative of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organiza- tion at a meeting of the Status of Women Commission here.

Emphasizing the cultural and civilizing influence of women in this role and their influence in improving the civic and social conditions in which they live and rear their families the UNESCO representative stated there must be support created for educating both boys and girls to become parents and for dispelling the prevailing prejudice that a girl's education is a wasted investment if she marries.

New 'Red' Law Promotes Divorces For Communists

Hong Kong — (NC) — Reports from Peiping reveal a steadily rising number of divorces in that city, particularly among com- munist party members, ever since the new Matrimonial Law became effective throughout China on May 1.

According to the new law, a divorce can be obtained by a simple device of registration if both parties agree to the sever- ance of marital ties. If one of the spouses refuses to agree to a divorce, an action is filed in court.

Only cases that have come up for judicial procedure are published in the daily press and the number or percentage of uncontested divorces is not known. A number of published di- vorce decisions in Shanghai reveal that most divorce decrees were based on the grounds that "when life in common is unbearable, divorce is granted."

Many young party members are from farming families of the interior who were dazzled by life in the large cities and dropped their old-fashioned country wives from back home to marry a more educated and more modern-looking city girl.

Married party members of five or more years' participation in communist activities are also released of personal responsibility for supporting their children. The latter are placed in state institutions.
