Farley Opens \$4,000,000 Drive For St. Bonaventure

"Give this drive the support and encouragement it so richly deserves, to help St. Bonaventure rise to take her place with the best colleges and universities in the country."

This was the message of the Hon. James A. Farley to alumni in the Southern Tier area opening the \$4,000,000 campaign for St. Bonaventure College at a dinner in Mark Twain Hotel, Elmira Sunday night. Farley is general chairman of the campaign, alumni phase of which was opened at the dinner.

"Actually, although I am not an alumnus, I have been in close contact with the progress of St. Bonaventure and have been kept in that state by our mutual friend and benefactor, Father Thomas Plassmann, former president of St. Bonaventure and now Provincial of the Holy Name Province of the Order of Friars Minor," Farley said.

The former Postmaster General and now board chairman of Coca-Cola was presented by William H. Kearney of Syracuse, national alumni chairman.

"I KNOW THAT this present expansion program is a vital necessity, if the college is to continue its excellent work," Mr. Farley declared.

Directing his speech to the alumni who will be doing the actual solicitation, Farley said: "Let me tell you gentlemen that there need be no element of shame in your approach when you seek contributions to St. Bonaventure. There is hardly a college in the country that is not seeking additional funds. You are in company with the alumni of the most respected institutions in the country."

He said that the common feeling was that religious orders are rich.

"THEY ARE rich in honor and respect and devotion. If they are rich in terms of wealth, it has escaped my observation. Large sums of money may be handled but it must be spread out thinly to carry out the vast program of service to humanity."

"My admiration," he declared, "goes out to the administration and business management that have forestalled the seeking of gift money until this late date."

Among other speakers were Very Rev. Thomas Plassmann, O.F.M., provincial of the Holy Name Province of the Order of Friars Minor; Very Rev. Juvenal Lator, O.F.M., St. Bonaventure College president; Very Rev. John Lambert Howan, O.F.M., rector of Christ the King Seminary; Rev. Gertrude McMillan, O.F.M., national lay secretary; Rev. Magr. Joseph B. McIntyre, national chairman.

Manchester, N.H. (NC)—James F. O'Neil, prominent Catholic layman, and past National Commander of the American Legion, has announced his resignation as chief of the Manchester police department to become operating head of the American Legion Magazine, with headquarters in New York City.

Mr. O'Neil, who has been an outspoken foe of communism, will serve as publisher of the Legion's monthly magazine, which with a circulation of more than 3,000,000 is America's seventh largest periodical.

Mr. O'Neil has been prominent in the Legion for many years and served as national commander in 1948.
