

### Catholic High Year Books Feature 2 Anniversaries

Anniversaries furnished the themes for both this "Aretis" senior year book of Aquinas Institute, and "The 1950 Lanthorn" of Nazareth Academy graduating class.

**NAZARETH ACADEMY**  
"The Lanthorn" is dedicated to the many Sisters of St. Joseph throughout the world and especially to the Sisters of St. Joseph of the Diocese of Rochester, who this year celebrate the three hundredth anniversary of the foundation of their congregation in France.

Interspersed with the photographic and editorial recordings of school life at Nazareth Academy especially of the class of 1950 are pictures and historical sidelights reviewing the achievements of the Sisters of St. Joseph in Rochester-diocese.

Up front in "The Lanthorn" is a prominent photograph of the present Bishop Kearney. The present Mother Superior, Reverend Mother Rose Allman, her predecessor, Reverend Mother Sylvester, who was general superior from 1921 to 1930, and the Rev. Mother Agnes, who presided as General Superior of the Sisters of St. Joseph from 1882 to 1921, are pictured on a double-page spread showing varied views of the Motherhouse on East Avenue.

**INDIVIDUAL** photographs of the members with their records of extracurricular activities follow departments of film views and explanations of school activities. Emphasizing religious study are photos in the chapel, the girls studying sacred symbols and learning of the early Crusades.

A striking photograph heads the Senior section and shows a Sister of St. Joseph and two of the girls reading the Rosary in the Chapel.

A dusty pink printing ink was used to give contrast throughout the book and was used for headlines and for emphasizing particularly the Sister St. Joseph Highlights of History. The book abounds in action photos of the girls in the many activities carried out at the girls' high school. Headlining a large staff which turned out the 1950 edition of "The Lanthorn" were Marianne K. Haggart, editor-in-chief; Margaret M. Ryan and Ann M. Schell, assistant editors; Marie F. Shroy and Jeanne M. Bennett, business managers.

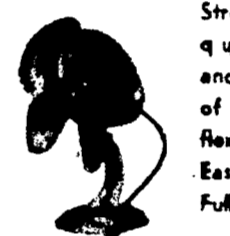
