KC Boy Leaders' Course Listed At Lemoyne College

Training for leadership will be the central theme of the 25th annual series of Summer Schools of Boy Leadership to be conducted by the Knights of Columbus Supreme Council Boy Life Bureau at twelve leading Catholic colleges and universities through out the United States and Canada during the months of July and August. The third session of the 1950 Summer School schedule is to be conducted at Le Moyne College, Syracuse on the weekend of July 21-22-23.

PATRICK J. O'HARA, 350 Kingsbury St. was elected a state director of the New York State Board of the AOH and Mrs. Bride Shannon, 290 Lexington Ave. was chosen treasurer of the Auxiliary. Close to 50 men and women from Monroe County attended the sessions.

A banquet in the Ten Eyck Hotel in Albany at which the Hon. Matthew Troy was principal speaker closed the convention. Judge John Sweeney of Troy, was toastmaster. New state officers were installed.

SOLEMN MASS at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Albany on Tuesday, Rev. Edward L. Curran, state chaplain, was celebrant of the Mass.

The Irish tricolor flag was presented to the Hibernians by An Taisceach John Costello, Prime Minister of Eire was accepted by Edward O'Neill and later flown from the staff at Albany City Hall.

At the business sessions the demand to "end Britain's 750 years confiscation of Irish territory" was made by Denis P. O'Leary. Mr. O'Leary pointed out that Britain is not reducing the menace of Communism "by denying the most elementary right of freedom to the Irish people to be sole rulers of their own country."

Life Magazine Disproved On Church Lands In Italy

Des Moines, Ia. (NC) — Statistics published by Life Magazine recently regarding land holdings by the Catholic Church in an Italian district were far from correct. Magr. Luigi Ligutti, executive secretary of the National Catholic Rural Life Conference, said here.

MONSIGNOR LIGUTTI pointed out that in an article in the magazine's April 24 issue, it was stated that in the district of Calabria the 70 per cent of arable land, 20 per cent was owned by the Church and only 10 per cent is left for the people.

The Monsignor obtained a report of recent studies made by Giuseppe Medici, Italian economist, in which it was shown that the Church land holdings in Calabria were two per cent not 20.

IN ITALY AS A WHOLE Monsignor Ligutti said the Church land holdings amount to only 1.67 per cent and this generally is small parcels well cared for and scattered throughout patches of the country. The Monsignor said there are no concentrated holdings of the Church.
