

Philippine Catholic Leaders Oppose Taxation Proposal

Manila — (AP) — A dispute has arisen here between the University of Santo Tomas, conducted by the Roman Catholic Dominican Order, and the Philippine Department of Finance over the question whether the centuries-old university and other religious institutions are subject to government taxes.

INTERNAL REVENUE agents recently insisted on examining the university's books for assessment purposes. University officials at once protested to Finance Secretary Pio Pedrosa, only to be informed that not only Santo Tomas but other religious educational institutions are liable to taxation.

Santo Tomas has complied with an order by Collector of Internal Revenue Bihlano L. Meer to open its books for inspection, but the university has instructed its lawyers to contest the Finance Secretary's decision, carrying the case to court, if necessary.

ACCORDING TO a statement sent to the Finance Secretary by the Very Rev. Angel de Blas, O.P., rector magnificus of the university, Santo Tomas has two main reasons for opposing the taxation move. One is that the collection of tuition and other fees from students is not, of itself, an activity conducted for profit. The other is that the revenue code exempts corporations or associations organized for educational purposes from taxes.

In all Catholic institutions in the Philippines, Father de Blas asserted, "the money obtained from tuition and fees go directly into the maintenance and improvement of the school. No part of said money goes to private stockholders or to other beneficiaries in or without the country."

Maryknoll Missioners Head Tanganyika Area In Africa

Maryknoll, N.Y. — Bishop Raymond A. Lane, Superior General of the Maryknoll Fathers, has received official notification from the Sacred Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith in Rome that the territory in which Maryknoll has been working in Tanganyika has been canonically erected as the Prefecture Apostolic of Musoma, and formally turned over to the Maryknoll Society.

THE NEW mission field entrusted to the Maryknollers is located on the northeastern shore of Lake Victoria, bordering Kenya and the historic Serengeti Plains, Africa's traditional big game country. The region is inhabited by a number of African tribes, of whom the Luo and the Somali and aristocratic Kikuyu are the best known. The population of the new mission is 25,000, of whom 8,851 are Catholic—or 34 per cent. The general proportion of Catholics in Tanganyika is 10 per cent.

At present Maryknoll has 12 priests, two Brothers and five Sisters in the mission. The Maryknoll Sisters have opened a native novitiate to train African nuns, and also conduct a medical dispensary and school. The mission was formerly under the direction of the White Fathers, and the Maryknollers have been working with them learning the languages and customs of the territory. The White Fathers will now withdraw, turning the en-

U. S. Defense Of Korea Not Expected By Stalin

ur's headquarters by men like General Omar Bradley, Secretary of War, Louis Johnson, Foster Dulles, and others. Moscow heard of the U. S. Task Force arriving in Hong Kong in the middle of June, consisting of aircraft carriers, destroyers, submarines and other naval units. But they also knew that the U. S. had limited the Korean army to two days' small ammunition.

Before American decisions could crystallize, Moscow struck, hoping to give the United States a fait accompli within a matter of 48 hours by a quick sweep through Korea. That would have been easily achieved if the Russians had acted some three weeks earlier, observers believe.

THE OLD PATTERN was used again. Well-equipped, excellently trained mechanized divisions swept down the Imjin River valley from the east and through Kaesong in the west right to the gates of Seoul. But as in the war against China it was the fifth-column inside South Korea which was to make victory easy. Communists and traitors sabotaged South Korean army morale. Armed fifth columnists infiltrated by sea along the jagged, indented coast to disrupt resistance.

But where Stalin had miscalculated was that he did not know decisions had been taken and could be acted upon by the West with the speed and determination the West had nowhere betrayed in all the long and weary post-war years of appeasing with the one exception of the Berlin airlift.

Now the issue is joined. The scale and the intensity of the fighting can vary. But Moscow can no longer obscure its aggressive military action. What was to be a preliminary clean-up action has ushered in the struggle whose battles may be intermittent and whose outline is clear.
