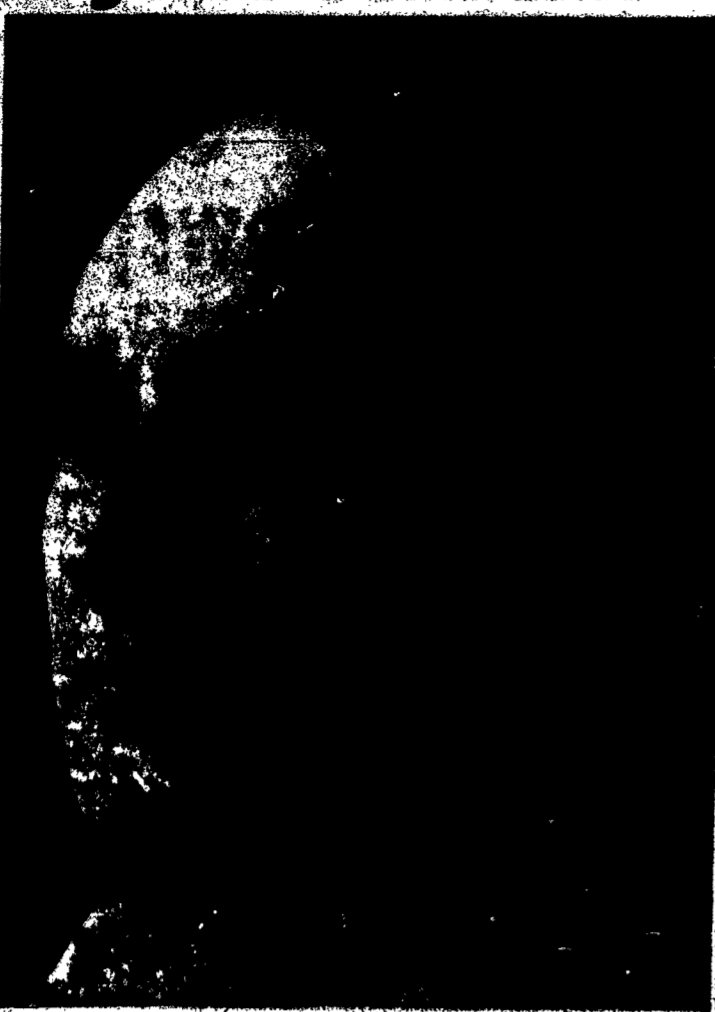


Handwriting Experts Testify: Card Mindszenty Trial Based On Red-Forged Documents

New York (NC)—Many of the documents used by Hungary's Communist government to convict Cardinal Mindszenty were forged, handwriting and document experts at the trial today testified. They said the documents were not only forged but also altered to make them appear to be the work of the Cardinal.

The experts testified that while Cardinal Mindszenty's confession was in his own handwriting, it contained unmistakable evidence of having been written after the Cardinal had been drugged and subjected to mental torture. Korean Bishop On Way To Home Land

Paris (NC)—Bishop Paul Re, Vicar Apostolic of Seoul and first native Korean bishop, has left Europe to return to his war-torn country. He had been in Europe making the Holy Year pilgrimage to Rome and visiting the French shrines of Lourdes, Lisieux and Chartres. He will return by way of Hong Kong.

Before leaving, Bishop Re said that in spite of travel difficulties, he intended to return to South Korea to start the trials of his fellow countrymen.

"If necessary," he stated, "I shall wear civilian clothes and go into hiding. I must be ready to suffer and, if need be, to die."

Slovakian Catholics Undergo Martyrdom Says Vatican Press

Rome (RNS)—Observators Romano, Vatican newspaper, charged that Latin and Greek Rite Catholics in Slovakia are undergoing a "martyrdom" similar to that experienced by the Ruthenian and Carpatho-Ukrainian Churches.

The newspaper said that secular authorities were pressuring Latin Rite Catholics to join a new "National Church" which is ruled by Communists.

GREEK RITE Catholics, it said, were being forced to renounce their ties with the Catholic Church and join the Orthodox Church.

Observators said that on April 28 a conference of Greek Rite Catholics was held in Presov presided over by a delegate of the Slovakian government.

This conference, the newspaper added, was attended by only five priests and a group of laymen. Observators said the conference was forced to approve a declaration proclaiming the "return of Catholics to Orthodoxy."

Since that time, the Vatican paper asserted, the authorities in Presov have made violent attempts to force Catholic priests to take up Orthodoxy.

OBSERVATORS SAID that Greek Rite Bishop Goida of Presov and his auxiliary, Msgr. Hopkow had both disappeared.

It said that schoolboys who refuse to renounce Catholicism are not allowed to pass their examinations.

Police search villages and arrest so-called refractory priests, the newspaper also charged.

"In January of this year the Slovakia diocese of the Czechoslovak Orthodox Church was created at a meeting in Presov. (Father Alexei Deferov was elected Bishop of the diocese at the meeting, which was presided over by Metropolitan Eleutherius, Orthodox Archbishop of Prague and Bohemia and Exarch of the Moscow Patriarchate in Czechoslovakia.)

Besides naming a new bishop, the Presov meeting elected an episcopal council for the Slovakia diocese.

In its review of the Slovakian situation, Observators recalled the fate of the Greek Catholic Church in Romania and the Ukraine where, it said, all bishops were either in prison or had been killed.

Japan Regime Aids Catholic Researchers

Tokyo (NC)—Six Catholics are included in the list of the Japanese research workers to whom the Ministry of Education here has granted special subsidies recently.

Topics being studied by these men include the following: The Church and the Medieval Code of Law (Professor Karita); biographical research concerning John Henry Newman after his conversion to Catholicism (Professor Noguchi); social welfare (Professor Otsuka); the relationship between Church law and civil law in England and America (Professor Kobayashi); inorganic chemistry—studies made with the new electronic microscope at the Catholic University in Tokyo (Professor Shibata); cultural forms and education in the Scandinavian countries and the history of music in western civilization (Professor Nomura).

Canada Statesman Reverses Stand On Vatican Envoy

Ottawa (RNS)—Reversing his stand against Canadian diplomatic representation at the Vatican, James Sinclair of British Columbia, parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Finance, has urged that Canada appoint an envoy to the Pope.

IN A LETTER to the Catholic Women's League and to Protestant bodies, Mr. Sinclair declared that a recent tour of eight European countries had convinced him that Canada was "losing information by not having a diplomatic representative at the Vatican."

"I met the Vatican's representative in Yugoslavia," Mr. Sinclair said, "and learned more from him about the country than I did from any other diplomatic representative in Belgrade."

"The Catholic Church is fighting Communism wherever it exists and it has no hesitation in accrediting representatives to even the Communist governments so that it may have all possible information."

Mr. Sinclair pointed out that discussion of a Canadian envoy to the Vatican had been on "religious grounds" and that he had sided with Protestants in opposing such an appointment until his experiences abroad caused him to change his views.

"IF AN APPOINTMENT were made at this time," he said, "a large proportion of our people would regard it as a religious appointment, and so be strongly opposed to it. Public discussion of this situation, however, will bring about a better understanding which might eventually lead us to have a representative in the Vatican as does Protestant England."

"The most certain way to assure the people of Canada that our representative was there for diplomatic reasons would be to have such Canadian ministers chosen from non-Catholic faiths."

Heads College, Faisal, India (NC)—The president of the Catholic Union of India, Mariadas Ruthanaswamy, has accepted an offer to become principal of the new St. Thomas College here.

Father Schwitalla To Mark Jubilee

St. Louis (NC)—The Rev. Alphonse M. Schwitalla, S. J., 67, dean emeritus of St. Louis University's medical school and one of the nation's best known medical educators, will observe the 50th anniversary of his entry into religious life on July 25 by offering a Solemn Mass in St. Francis Xavier (College) Church here.

Father Schwitalla, who retired from active duties last year, at one time served simultaneously as dean of the medical school, dean of the nursing school, regent of the dentistry school, director of the biology department and acting dean of the graduate school at the university.
