China Reds Take Church Property

Beijing (AP)—The Agrarian Reform Law of the Communist dominated People's Republic of China, which became effective on June 30, specifies that rural land belonging to monasteries, churches, schools and other institutions shall be redistributed.

The confiscation of these lands from privately owned lands, farm implements and stock is to precede the redistribution of these properties among the poorer peasants who own little or no land.

The properties that have been purchased by the Catholic Church in China during the course of centuries have been used solely for the support of charitable and educational purposes. The law in becoming effective will deprive these institutions of their source of support.

In laying down the principles to be followed in the redistribution of the confiscated properties, the law states that "monks, nuns, priests, and other religious personnel should be given shares

Fallen-Away Catholics Are Blamed on Parental Neglect

Spokane, Wash., (NC)—Failure of Catholic parents to provide their children with a Catholic education all the way from the elementary school through the college level is one of the chief reasons why there are so many fallen-away Catholics in the nation. Bishop Charles D. White of Spokane said in a pastoral letter.

The prelate's views were addressed to parents who give their children Catholic elementary and high school educations and then permit their children to attend a non-Catholic college.

"Considering the times in which we live," the Bishop stated, "the prevalence of religious errors, widespread religious indifference, the reputation of the moral law on the part of millions, nothing less than unwavering devotedness to Christ and to His Church based on a true and deep knowledge of Him and His teachings will guarantee continued fidelity to Him."

THE CONTENTION that state colleges and universities are neutral toward religion and do not interfere with the students' religious belief or moral code, Bishop White declared, has been refuted by a number of surveys which disclosed that professors in such institutions influence students with erroneous ideas about God, the Catholic Church and the moral law.

The Bishop said that one of the dangers of sending a child educated in Catholic schools to a non-Catholic college lies in the fact that the student has not yet been trained in philosophy or theology and can easily be led to accept unwittingly a false philosophy.

"But even if the student has the good fortune of escaping the hazards of erroneous teachings," Bishop White said, "he is nevertheless deprived of the positive advantages of a Catholic higher education in religion and morality that he so greatly needs in his contacts with the world."

U. S. Vet Ordained in Rome At First Rites Since '40

Rome (NC)—North American College has just celebrated an historic "First" day. The first veteran of World War II was ordained in the first ordination ceremony in the college chapel since the spring of 1944.

Also he was the first priest ordained by the rector of the college, Bishop Martin O'Connor, since he was appointed to the episcopacy.

The Rev. George Schlichte of the Sacred Heart parish, Lexington, Mass., a Boston Archdiocesan priest, was ordained today. He is the only student to have completed the three-year theology course at this time. The ceremony took place in the historic college chapel, where His Eminence Edward Cardinal Mooney, Archbishop of Detroit, and the late William Cardinal O'Connell of Boston and Archbishop Kennedy, former rector, were consecrated.

An Annapolis graduate, Father Schlichte served for three and one-half years at sea as a Navy officer with the grade of lieutenant, and collected five battle stars for his part in the operations off North Africa, Sicily, Salerno, Anzio and southern France.

His parents, both physicians, Dr. George and Agnes Schlichte, of Lexington, as well as several relatives and friends were present for the ordination ceremony.

Mgr. Edward Murray, rector of St. John's Seminary, Boston, several priests and some pilgrims, among whom were graduates of the seminary, were also present.

Bishop O'Connor, consecrated as Titular Bishop of Thespia and Auxiliary of Scranton, Pa., in January of 1943, had never had an occasion to ordain a priest before. He was assisted by the Vice-Rector of the Seminary, Very Rev. Monsignor Richard K. Burns of Rochester, N. Y.
