The church grounds will be set up as a suitable location for the event according to the Rev. John M. Ball, pastor.

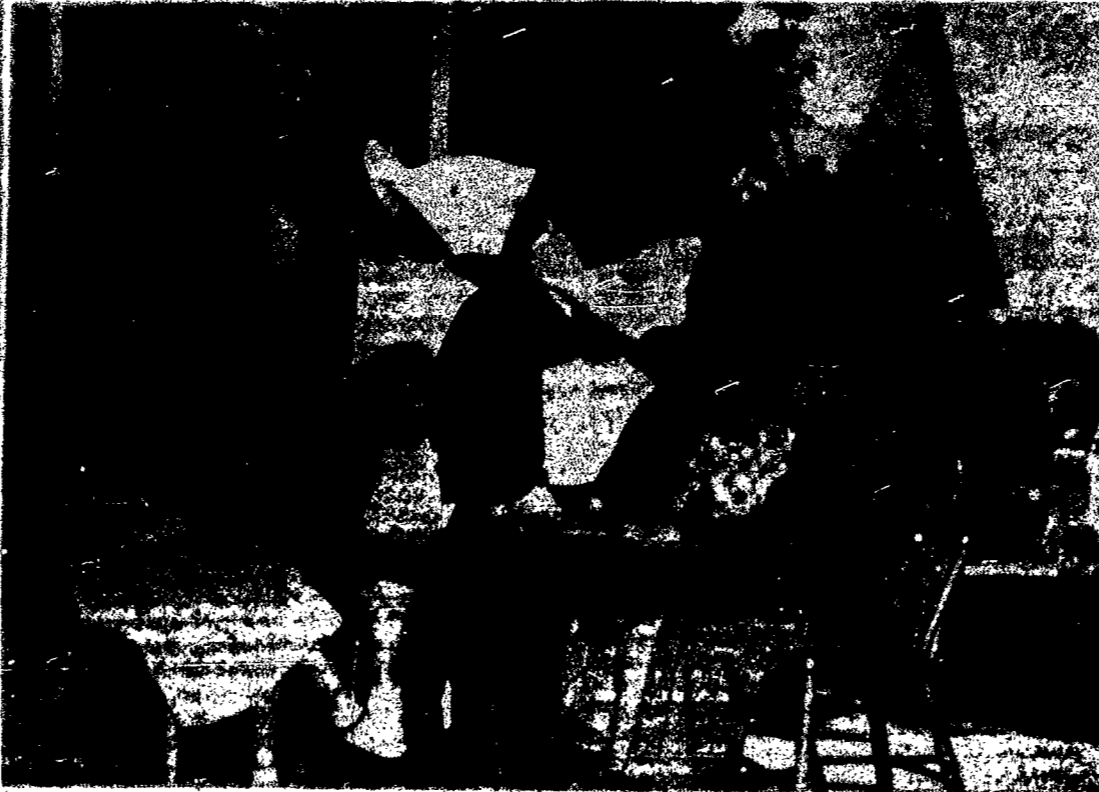

RBI Offers \$240 Scholarship For Youth Week Essay

A \$240 tuition scholarship has been presented to the Youth Week Committee by Ernest W. Veigel, Jr., Rochester Business Institute president according to Councilman August J. Muehleisen, general chairman of the city of Rochester's Third Annual Youth Week.

The scholarship is to be awarded to a City of Rochester high school boy or girl who writes the best essay on the topic "Why Youth Week Benefits Our Community."

Muehleisen states there are no annoying rules concerning the contest and no entry blanks are required. Contestants, present students or recent high-school graduates are eligible, will be required to write an essay to and submit their composition to Harry J. Gaynor, Youth Week Executive Director, at 56-58 South Fitzhugh Street no later than midnight August 14.

CONTESTANT SHOULD give his name, address, age and present school attended or the name of a high school from which he was recently graduated.

The value of the scholarship is \$240 per year for two years to be applied against tuition in the regular Rochester Business Institute day school. If winner uses the scholarship for evening school, the value of it will be \$50 per year for two years. It is understood that this scholarship will be used by the successful essay writer.

The scholarship will be honored by the Rochester Business Institute any time on or before September 1, 1951.

The award to the winner will be made in ceremonies to be conducted at City Hall, scheduled for 12 noon, Monday, August 21. Ernest W. Veigel, Jr., president of the Rochester Business Institute will make the presentation.

University Charter Granted To St. Bonaventure College

Action of the New York Board of Regents to amend St. Bonaventure College charter changing the name to St. Bonaventure University has been announced.

Founded in 1856, the school was incorporated in March 1, 1875 as St. Bonaventure College by the New York State Regents. Conducted by the Franciscans of the Order of Friars Minor, the school expanded greatly during post-war years. Enrollment jumped from an average 475 pre-war total to the more than 2000 during the 1949-50 academic year.

IN HIS COMMENT on the announcement which came on the octave day of the feast of St. Bonaventure, seraphic doctor and patron of Franciscan schools, the Very Rev. Juvenal Lator, O.F.M., president, said: "Our new name gives more concrete expression to the widening scope of St. Bonaventure's educational activities and to the steady growth of its contributions to the advancement of learning and service of the community as a whole.

"Needless to say, the action of the regents in our behalf is a most stimulating challenge to expand judiciously and perfect relentlessly what has been built up steadily the past 94 years," he added.

New schools and departments have been established during recent years including a school of education with its department of physical education, and the school of elementary school training. New departments in journalism and finance and banking have also been established.

Other schools are the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, the School of Business Administration, and the School of Theology of Christ the King Seminary, its existence since the founding of St. Bonaventure.

Morale Awareness Noted Among Military

Military emphasis on morale in the armed forces was surprising to the Very Rev. John S. Randall, Rochester representative at the Associated Services To the Armed Forces conference at the Pentagon, he told the Gannett News Service, Friday.

"It is very revealing," he added. "That the military is so very conscious of the job that must be done to extend the scope of civilian thinking on morale."

The military appears much more conscious today than at the beginning of World War II of the need of keeping morale high, according to Monsignor Randall. The Rochester prelate was chairman of the National Catholic Community Service Committee on Rochester's United Services Organization (USO).
