Tokyo, Japan—(NC)—Japan has its own catechism in braille thanks to the work of a blind woman from Suffolk, Va., who took her degree as a Bachelor of Science in Columbia University, N. Y., in 1914.

She decided then that Japan was the place where she could do the greatest amount of good.

The story of Genevieve Caulfield's life is an epic in order to prepare herself for work in Japan, she taught English to several Japanese in New York for seven years and studied the Japanese language herself. She came to Japan where she continued as an English teacher until that language became unpopular shortly before the war.

CONTACT WITH a Japanese embassy official convinced her that a great opportunity awaited her in Japan and she started a school for the blind there.

**Mary Moore Made Papal Countess By Holy Father**

Washington—(NC)—The title of Papal Countess has been conferred on Mrs. Mary Young Moore, Catholic lay woman and benefactor by His Holiness Pope Pius XII. It has been learned here.

Countess Moore is a native of Los Angeles and maintains residence both there and in New York. She has contributed large sums in recent years to assist the Holy Father in his relief work for victims of war, and has also generously assisted various charitable and educational institutions in the Los Angeles and New York archdioceses.

In 1940 Countess Moore was awarded the papal cross "Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice," and in 1946, she was named a Dame of the Holy Sepulcher. A graduate of Immaculate Heart College, Los Angeles, she was awarded an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws by the University of Notre Dame in 1931. She has at various times served as vice president of the National Conference of Catholic Charities, 1921-23; vice president of the American Catholic Historical Society, and on the advisory board of the American Federation of Labor.
