

Office Workers Shortage Revealed

An increasingly serious shortage of qualified office workers to fill responsible positions in the Rochester area is reflected in urgent requests for personnel received by the Job Placement Bureau of Rochester Business Institute.

Ernest W. Vogel Jr., HRM president, reports that in July alone BBI's placement director, Mrs. Eleanor Kellogg, was able to fill only 50 per cent of 148 requests for Institute graduates. These requests were for secretaries, medical secretaries, typists, business machine operators, bookkeepers, accountants and salesmen.

17 From Diocese Granted Special Papal Audience

Castel Gandolfo, Italy — (Special) — Seventeen Rochester Diocesan pilgrims were privileged to have a special audience with Pope Pius XII at his summer residence here Aug. 8.

They included the Rev. Albert J. Shannon of the Aquinas Institute faculty, the Rev. Edward J. Tolson, assistant pastor of St. Augustine's Church, fourteen Sisters of Mercy and Francis J. Pilbeck, 45 Holbrook St., Rochester, an Aquinas student.

Arranged by Fr. Miller were the pilgrims for the audience, during which His Holiness spoke with each one personally, were made by Jesuit scientist Father Walter J. Miller, a native Rochesterian and the only American among the select group of Papal attendees who operate the Vatican Observatory here.

THE ROCHESTER Diocesan party was with the Sodality of Our Lady pilgrimage which on Aug. 2 joined with 25,000 others at a general audience with Pope Pius in St. Peter's Cathedral.

Father Miller, who often works personally with the Pontiff in giving him the proper pronunciation of American names, surprised the group by arranging the special audience following its visit to the Observatory. Special audiences of this nature are rare privileges.

The Holy Father appeared particularly pleased, when assured by some of the Sisters that they fully understood and appreciated the brief talk he had given in English to the large Rodeally audience the day before.
