

# Effects of Marriages, Shortages, War On St. Mary's Nurses Explained By Aide

How does marriage affect the profession of nursing?

"Nurses marry no later in life than girls in other professions and careers. Many of our girls continue to work following marriage and then often return to duty after their families have grown up sufficiently to allow them time to work." This was the answer given by one of the nurses on the staff of St. Mary's Hospital, Rochester.

"The shortage of nurses is still being felt in St. Mary's. Of the thirty-one young women to be graduated this year from the hospital, about ten plan to go into public health nursing. The remaining number will be divided between the staff at St. Mary's and those returning to their home towns to practice.

SEVERAL NURSES from St. Mary's are considering entering the armed services, but as yet the percentage is not too great. In World War II St. Mary's was well represented among those serving the armed forces overseas and here in this country.

The graduate nurse from a Catholic hospital has received training superior to that of her sister nurses in non-sectarian hospitals where medical training goes untaught, according to Miss Cary Guilmette, assistant director of nursing service. "Both psychology and sociology fortify the Catholic nurse for the difficult profession that is her choice," she said.

IN CONSIDERING the overall picture, Miss Guilmette said: "As a profession nursing pays off in satisfaction over and above the mental and physical strain every nurse experiences. The mental strain should not be overlooked," she added, "because every nurse has the welfare of the patient foremost in her mind."

"The good nurse realizes that the success of her job hinges on her untiring attitude to give service to others," the assistant director stated. "The irregular hours and inconveniences that go with the profession are overshadowed by the fact that the conscientious nurse is aware of her role in saving lives and preserving good health."
