## \$10,012 Mark Reached In Radio Rosary Drive

A \$415 donation from Blessed Sacrament parishioners for the continuation of the nightly Family Rosary for Peace broadcasts pushed the current fund-drive to \$10,012 this week, the program's executive committee announced today.

In two weeks since the group sent a pictorial direct-mail appeal to families in the Rochester area requesting financial assistance for the radio program, 3,265 individual donors have mailed in \$6,597 to underwrite the radio-Rosary budget for the year, the committee stated.

With less than two-thirds of the budgeted expenses covered by the present \$10,012, the committee is hoping to hear from at least 1,000 more individual donors who will contribute \$2, \$5, or \$10 to sustain the program. Donations from families in the diocesan outside of Rochester which hear the program only on Sunday evenings will be especially welcomed.

A SPECIAL FUND, inaugurated by His Excellency Bishop Kearney with his personal check for \$200 has brought in another \$3,415. The Blessed Sacrament gift, collected at all the Masses in that church last Sunday was an answer to a special appeal sent to all Rochester churches and diocesan groups in the name of Bishop Kearney.

The following 14 other parishes and societies have contributed \$200 apiece to the radio-fund:
