What's the Prospect When You Grow Old?

NEED HELP?
 Come to the National Conference of Aging, recently held in Washington, the prediction was made that the life span of man might be extended well beyond 100 years.
 "What a long sentence to serve in this world," a little old lady sighed.
 Whether that "long sentence" will prevail in our time remains to be seen; meantime the conference attempted to add life to years, rather than years to life.
 In the conference of 800 people, an attempt was made to evaluate the potentialities of older people and to promote research on aging in fields of employment, health, education, recreation, rehabilitation, social and psychological adjustment.

Life for the Aged." The consensus of social workers was that elderly people crave independence without isolation. They want to be free to move about, yet more than ever before, they need the reassurance of being loved and needed by their families. They want short, frequent visits or letters; they want to "keep in touch."
 Since most elderly people live in a family life, rather than an institutional one, the question was asked: "What kind of family would you like to grow old in?"
 Dr. Leo W. Simmons, professor of anthropology at Cornell Medical School, knew pretty definitely the kind he wanted. Here's what Dr. Simmons would like:

1. TO HAVE his spouse with him. "And that," the Chairman smiled, "is, statistically speaking, taken care of since women live five years longer than their husbands."
2. To live in a large family, providing a great variety of personal contacts. There would be babies, children, teen-agers and young adults; and to run the show, there would be mature, middle-aged persons. "Always plenty of people to talk to and
3. To hold onto property rights. There is a feeling of independence that comes with knowing that you have actual ownership of property or capital. Rather than "turn it over to the children," Dr. Simmons thinks it better for the aged to retain at least a part of the property rights.
4. To have his position in the family defined. "I want to be told when they think I'm old," Dr. Simmons said with a twinkle in his eyes. "I want to know where I stand in relation to the family. Of course," he added, "I'd prefer tact—but tact or no tact, I want to be told."
5. To live with people "it's dangerous for very old people or children to live alone. If I'd say I wanted to live alone, I'd like them to take me to a psychiatrist who'd tell me why I wanted to live alone."
6. TO HAVE something stable: a familiar setting gives a sense of security in old age. Where this isn't possible, there should at least be remembrances of old days—familiar furniture, family portraits. There should never be an "all brand new" environment for the aged.
7. To be appreciated: there is nothing that gives such an "on the shelf" feeling as being cared for physically and out of a sense of duty. There should be recognition of and appreciation for what an older person has done, and for the person he is within himself right now.
8. To make a contribution: the contribution need not be economic but one of knowledge, wisdom, experience and genuine interest in the lives about him. What kind of a family would you like to grow old in?

Nylon Achieves Boots With Less Weight, More Warmth
 Nylon has given new style-and-comfort importance to cold-weather boots, bringing remarkably lightweight yet warm overshoes in attractive design. Available this fall for women and children, the new cold weather footwear is made with an outer fabric of all nylon in a subtly lustrous weave.
 The warm lining is a luxuriously soft, deep pile nylon fabric. Bindings, thread, and sock lining of the boot are also nylon. Soles are crepe rubber. Trim is shearingling.
 Although lightweight the manufacturer's tests show that the warmth-to-weight ratio of the nylon pile fabric, a recent development, is probably one of the best produced.
 THE PATENTED design of the boots assures a comfortable fit and also adds to their style appeal. To assure good shape they are lasted and have a modified moccasin toe.
 Heels are constructed with counters to prevent them from crushing down in wearing.
 Another comfort feature is the boot's flexibility, which also simplifies packing. In a suitcase, the tops can be folded over, reducing the space needed for overshoes.
 As weather protectors, the new boots offer a shield from wetness as well as from cold. To make them shed rain and snow the outer fabric is treated with "Zelan" durable repellent finish.
 Because nylon boots are highly resistant to scuffing they can be counted on to keep their good appearance in wear.
 Two styles are obtainable. One bearing the brand "Nylaboot" with zipper closing comes in sizes for both women and children to fit over either flat or Cuban heel shoes. The shearingling trim is the usual turn-over cuff. Zippers are self-locking to hold them in position whether pulled up part way or full length.
 In dressier style is "Nylaqueen", a tie boot which is made in women's sizes only designed for all heel heights. Fur trim in carriage boot style edges the top and sides of the opening and the top of the tongue.
 Colors available in both styles and all sizes are black, brown, green, royal blue, and red. The trim is in matching color except on the black boots which have gray shearingling.

Among Women Follow The Weider Trail

Within the past few days as far distant as India, Rochester friend has sent me some very interesting clippings with the suggestion that they might contain material suitable for use in this column.
 Since some of these items were originally printed only in Rochester edition of the Courier, I believe that they bear repetition for the benefit of readers in other parts of the diocese.
 During January, 1945 in the terrible and memorable Battle of the Bulge in Belgium, Private Joseph G. Weider lost his life. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence A. Weider of 329 Westfall Road in Brighton, were equally heroic in the part they were chosen to play. Instead of disavowing in grief, they determined to make the memory of their soldier son live on in the spiritual lives of as many people as possible and so they inaugurated a series of religious acts by which they hoped to bring God closer to all of us and all of us closer to Him.

ONE of their first acts was to have printed copies of a pamphlet, "Blessings Before and After Childbirth." These Miss Weider, herself the mother of six children, distributed to friends and to the maternity clinic at St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester.
 Next she influenced Father George J. Schmitt, then pastor of St. Anne's in Brighton, to give the blessings after all Masses on the first Sunday of each month, a practice still continued in the parish, and on the first Wednesday of each month at the hospital clinic.
 Father Schmitt has since been transferred to the pastorate of Holy Family Church, Rochester where he continues the blessings
