School's Opening Marks 75 Years For Nuns In Lima

A new modernized school with the largest student enrollment in the history of St. Rose's Church of Lima, helped mark a significant date in parochial history this week the 75th anniversary of the arrival of the Sisters of St. Joseph to teach the Catholic children of Lima.

Back in the fall of 1875, according to parish records disclosed by the Rev. John M. Bail pastor, three Sisters of St. Joseph took over three rooms in a converted old church as one of their first missions in diocese teaching work.

The parish school had been in operation for 19 years previously in a one-room frame building with a succession of lay women teachers.

TODAY A STAFF of five Sisters instruct 122 children from kindergarten through first year high school with the most modern and efficient equipment available.

The present school, built in 1894 by the Rev. Simon Fitzsimmons, has been remodeled this summer at a cost of \$8,000 to add four modern new rooms to the school. Besides two new soundproof rooms to give the school five classrooms, the extension has provided a new library and a projection room for visual aid projects.

The enlargement enables two classes to be accommodated in each room instead of three as formerly.

St. Rose's claims the distinction of being the oldest parochial high school in the diocese, dating its freshman class from 1889.

Admitting that more than one-half of the children ride to St. Rose's from rural sections of the public school district buses, Father Bail said that the enlarged building offers room for about 60 more children which parish growth may soon provide.

2 Masses Open Services In West Webster Church

More than 600 persons inspected the newest Catholic church in the diocese last weekend when two Masses celebrated Sunday, Sept. 3, signaled the opening of St. Rita's Church, West Webster.

The Rev. Francis A. Kleehammer, first pastor, pointed out that the first Mass was celebrated just 4 1/2 months after work on the church building began. Formal dedication ceremonies will be held later in the fall.

Celebrant of the first of the two Masses was the Rev. Arthur F. Florack pastor of St. Michael's Church, Rochester who was instrumental in purchasing the 23 acre West Webster property and in aiding in construction of the church building. Father Kleehammer who prior to appointment as pastor was assistant to Father Florack at St. Michael's, offered the second Mass.

TWO MASSES will be offered each Sunday at 8:30 and 10:30 a.m. in the wood frame building which will seat 300 persons. During construction of a new rectory beside the church slated for completion in mid-October, Father Kleehammer has made his temporary headquarters in a large room of the church.

Work is continuing on reconstruction of a large barn on the property into a parish hall.

Situated at Ridge Road East and Maple Drive, just east of Bay Road, the church was erected in the dismantled building which served St. Margaret Mary's parish Irondequoit for 20 years prior to dedication of that parish's new edifice last February.

St. Rita's parish embraces the area bounded by Lake Ontario, Whiting Rd., Five Mile Lane Rd., Emberry Rd., and Irondequoit Bay.
