

Anglican Raps At Assumption Aids Leftists

Dr. Fisher's statement "de pletely foreign to the Bible and ancient universal beliefs." It was widely publicized in the leftist press, according to Osservatore.

This is remarkable, it points out, because the leftist press generally ignores matters on the score that material things are far

However, by the very use of or. Fisher's statement, the leftist ress defeated its own propaganda theme, the Vatican paper said. The Red press had previously stated that the Holy See was holding off its proclamation of the Assumption because of

"pro-American politics" The editorial points out that Dr. Fisher's predecessor, Archbishop Lanfranco, placed the Feast of the Assumption among principal feasts of the Madonna in the Canterbury ecclesiastical calendar, that devotion to the Feast of the Assumption dates back to the time of St. Augustine, that there is a five-century old monument to the Assumption in the Anglican cathedral of the Archbishop of York, and that the inscription of the Assumption has been on the crest of Eton College in England since 1447.

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
