'Open House' Draws 1,000 To Capuchin Seminary

Geneva — Dedication of the main altar of the chapel and two statues featured "open house" at the immaculate heart of Mary Seminary on Lochland Road, Sunday which attracted more than 1,000 visitors.

The north wing contains the dormitory and refectory. The south wing houses the chapel on the first floor, class rooms on the second and study hall and recreation room on the third. Building costs at the seminary since its purchase, have been estimated at \$200,000.

Buildings are heated by oil. The kitchen is modern "not elaborate" as one of the priests explained, but "very useful." There is an 18 foot deep freeze, two sinks, each five feet long, and a large restaurant table with overhead shelves for pots and pans. Dishes are mostly of unbreakable plastic.

Newly completed is an asphalt playground, 100 by 60 feet. It proved useful yesterday as a parking lot. It is also used for a roller skating court, basketball and other games.

Seminary laundry equipment is automatic, featuring a large dryer. Clothes do not have to be hung out to dry, but may just be taken out and pressed.

First objective on the seminary tour was the press room where visitors were shown shown where the "Junior Clarion," seminary bulletin, is published.

2,500 Women Expected At Cleveland Silver Jubilee Convention of NCCW

More than 2,500 persons are expected to attend the four-day silver jubilee convention of the National Council of Catholic Women, opening in Cleveland on Sunday, Oct. 15 with the theme of "Peace in Our Days."

Heading the Rochester Diocesan Council delegation will be Mrs. Frank T. Curtin, a national director and Mrs. Frank G. Shaughnessy.

Bishop Edward F. Hoban of Cleveland will formally open the convention with a solemn Pontifical Mass in the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist on Sunday, October 15, and at least 13 other members of the Hierarchy will participate in the sessions at the Hotel Statler. More than 1,500 official delegates from diocesan councils throughout the United States are coming to the convention.

Because of anticipated widespread interest in the evening meetings they will be open to the general public and held in the Cleveland Public Auditorium Music Hall, which accommodates 3,000 persons. Both men and women are invited to these evening sessions.

KEYNOTE OF the convention will be sounded by Archbishop Robert E. Lucey of San Antonio, Episcopal Chairman of the Lay Organizations Department, National Catholic Welfare Conference, which comprises the National Council of Catholic Men and the National Council of Catholic Women. He will address the first evening meeting Sunday night, speaking on "Principles for Peace."

Mayor Thomas A. Burke of Cleveland and Mrs. A. J. Bender of Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, general convention chairman, will welcome the delegates at this meeting.

Representatives of seven foreign countries will be at the convention as observers of speakers. Among them will be Mrs. Ann Boyd of Durban, South Africa, past president of the Catholic Women's League. Other nations to be represented will include Switzerland, Korea, Germany, Australia, Mexico and Argentina.

Stress will be placed on the practical at the convention, and delegates will be on the go from 8 a. m. Mass in the Cathedral every weekday morning until after the nightly meetings at 8 p. m. Business meetings and conferences will be held in the morning, and workshops in the afternoon.
