**Aid Youth, Educator Urges 60 Watkins Glen H. N. Men**

Watkins Glen — Do "something substantial" for the youth of Watkins Glen, the Rev. Claude Zubinski, O.F.M., rector of Padua High School urged upon 60 St. Mary's Church Holy Name Society men at their Communion breakfast in Glen Park Restaurant, Sunday.

"What facilities do your youngsters have?" he asked. "What can they do for an evening? Where can they go for an evening?" he queried.

"I'm told that the youngsters graduate from the pool halls to the taverns in Watkins Glen," Father Claude said.

The priest told the Holy Name men that they are leaders in the community, many of them prominently.

"If just a few of you would do something," he pleaded.

"WHY CAN'T something substantial be done in Watkins Glen to make the town buzz as far as youth construction is concerned?" Father Claude asked.

Citing successful youth programs under the auspices of the Holy Name Society in other parishes, Father Claude asked the men to make a youth program here their aim.

"Your society is only as strong as the members make it," he said. "And it is your activity that makes it strong."

Other groups, service organizations like Rotary and the American Legion, have projects that serve to keep them active and strong, Father Claude said.

"SET UP AS your goal the care of your youth," he advised. Father Claude told the men that they should be able to do a lot because the Holy Name Society is the only men's organization in St. Mary's parish. It is easy for them to concentrate their attention on the society, he said.

Earlier, 16 new members had been received by the Holy Name Society in a special ceremony following seven o'clock Mass. The entire group of men, about 80 strong, received Holy Communion in a body at Mass.

Father Claude was introduced by Jack Love, president of the society. Dr. William J. Frank was breakfast chairman.

The society will attend Mass and receive Communion together again November 12, Love said. Monthly meeting will be held the following evening.

**'Open House' Draws 1,000 To Capuchin Seminary**

Geneva — Dedication of the main altar of the chapel and two statues featured "open house" at the Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary on Lochland Road, Sunday which attracted more than 1000 visitors.

Officialing at ceremonies, advanced because of rain, was the Very Rev. Andrew E. Petralia, O.F.M., Cap. of Orange, N. J., provincial of the order.

The seminary is conducted by the Capuchins of the Province of Stigmata of St. Francis. Student enrollment is 25 and the Very Rev. Michael Ristort, O.F.M., Cap. & superior.

Visitors from Geneva and as far west as Oakland, Calif. were met by priests and seminarians who escorted them about the grounds and through the building and answered questions about the seminary.

Seminarians who act as house keepers were commended by visitors on the cleanliness of the building. Two new wings of the seminary drew special interest.

The north wing contains the dormitory and refectory. The south wing houses the chapel on the first floor, class rooms on the second and study hall and recreation room on the third. Building costs at the seminary since its purchase, have been estimated at \$300,000.

Buildings are heated by oil. The kitchen is modern "not elaborate" as one of the priests explained, but "very useful." There is an 18 foot deep freeze, two sinks, each five feet long, and a large restaurant table with overhead shelves for pots and pans. Dishes are mostly of unbreakable plastic.

Newly completed is an asphalt playground, 100 by 60 feet. It proved useful yesterday as a parking lot. It is also used for a roller skating court, basketball and other games.

First objective on the seminary tour was the press room where visitors were shown where the "Junior Clarion," seminary bulletin, is published.

**Nuns Served In Epidemic At Mt. Morris**

Mt. Morris — The Sisters of St. Joseph, living and deceased who have served St. Patrick's parish since 1912 were honored here Sunday, October 8 when the Rev. Thomas F. Brennan pastor of St. Patrick's, offered the 9 o'clock Mass for them.

Celebrating the 300th anniversary of the founding of the order, some 20 nuns of the order from the neighboring convents attended the Mass in a body with the nuns of St. Patrick's Convent and were entertained at dinner at the convent.

In the afternoon they inspected St. Patrick's School that was opened in 1912 by the Rev. Andrew E. Breen D.D. who was pastor of St. Patrick's at that time.

**THE NAMES** of the first nuns to come to Mt. Morris were Sister Sebastian, Sister Alcantara, Sister Cyrilian, Sister Aurelia, Sister Odilia, and Sister Gerard Magella.

During the influenza epidemic of World War I the sisters endeared themselves to the people of Mt. Morris when they volunteered to care for those stricken by the plague.

Sister Francis Xavier contracted the disease from contact with the sick and died.

The principal work of the Sisters of St. Joseph throughout their years in Mt. Morris has been as members of the faculty of St. Patrick's School on Stanley Street.
