From the kindergarten through the eighth grade exhibits were colorful and showed evidence of careful preparation. Color signal charts and drawings of traffic light posts portrayed the importance of pedestrian safety in the minds of the tiny tots.

First graders' skill was shown in health posters; walking milk bottles and tumblers, exemplified good eating habits. Careful handwork was told in cutouts of teddybears, pumpkin men and squirrels.

Second grade pupils showed skill in free hand crayoning as their exhibit carried out a seagull motif with tiny sailboats. Wholesomeness of farm-life was portrayed in a blackboard exhibit of the third grade as well as color charts and checkerboard symmetry.
