Pyenyang, North Korea-(NC). Three days of inquiries in this former communist capital of North Koren have falled to uncover any news of Boshop Patrick J. Byrne, Apostolic Delegate to Korsa, of Washington, D the Rev. William Booth, secretary of Bishop Byrne and Maryknoller of Rockville Center, N Y.; Magr. Thornes Quinlan, Irish Columban missionary and Prefect Apostolic of Choochun. Protestant Bishop Cooper of the Church of England, and Salvation Army Commissioner Herbert Lord, an Englishman.
