THE PURPOSE of the educational exchange program authorized by the Fulbright Act is to further good will and understanding between the other countries through the exchange of students, teachers, lecturers, research scholars and specialists.

Although the element of scholarship is important in the selection of candidates, the most significant factor is the contribution of an individual to the program in terms of the total impact of his participation, his suitability as a representative of his country and the continuing effects of his fluency of his experience in the direction of ultimate World Peace.

Awards are usually made for the period of one academic year and are made solely in foreign currencies in an amount sufficient to cover tuition, maintenance, transportation and incidental expenses.

Awards are available for study and teaching in many countries, including Australia, France, Greece, Italy, the Netherlands, United Kingdom and Norway.

Guidance Address Scheduled For Aquinas Mothers Tuesday

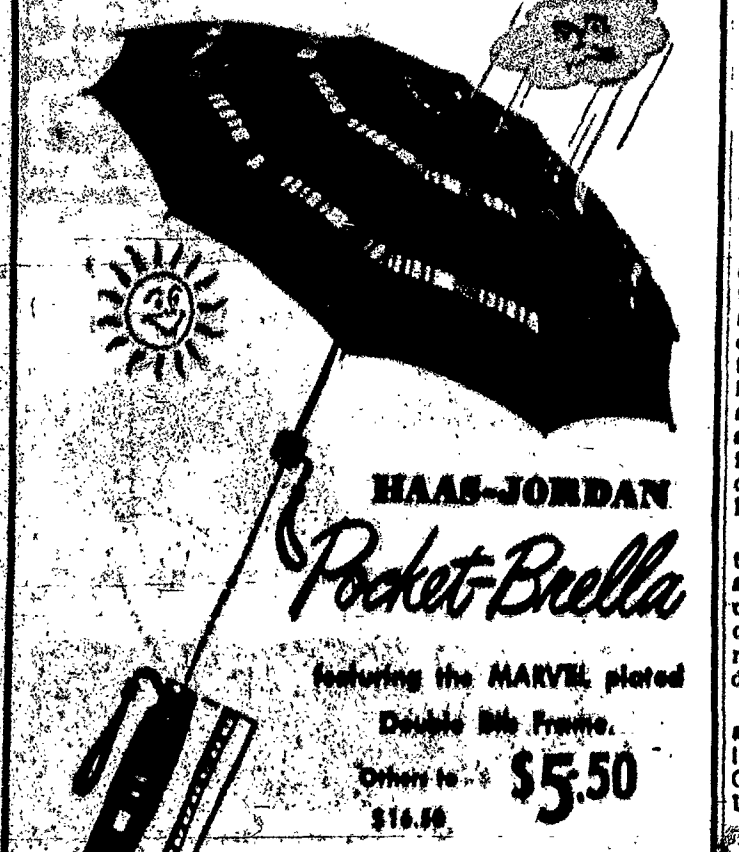

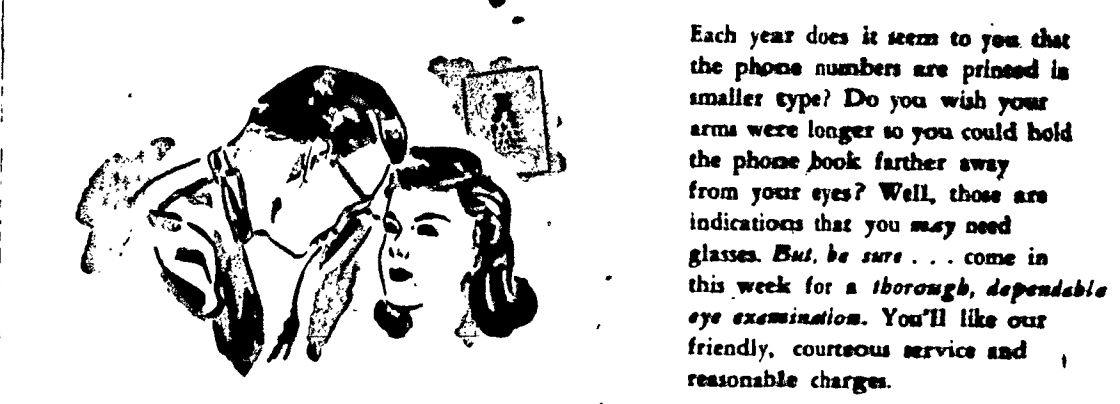

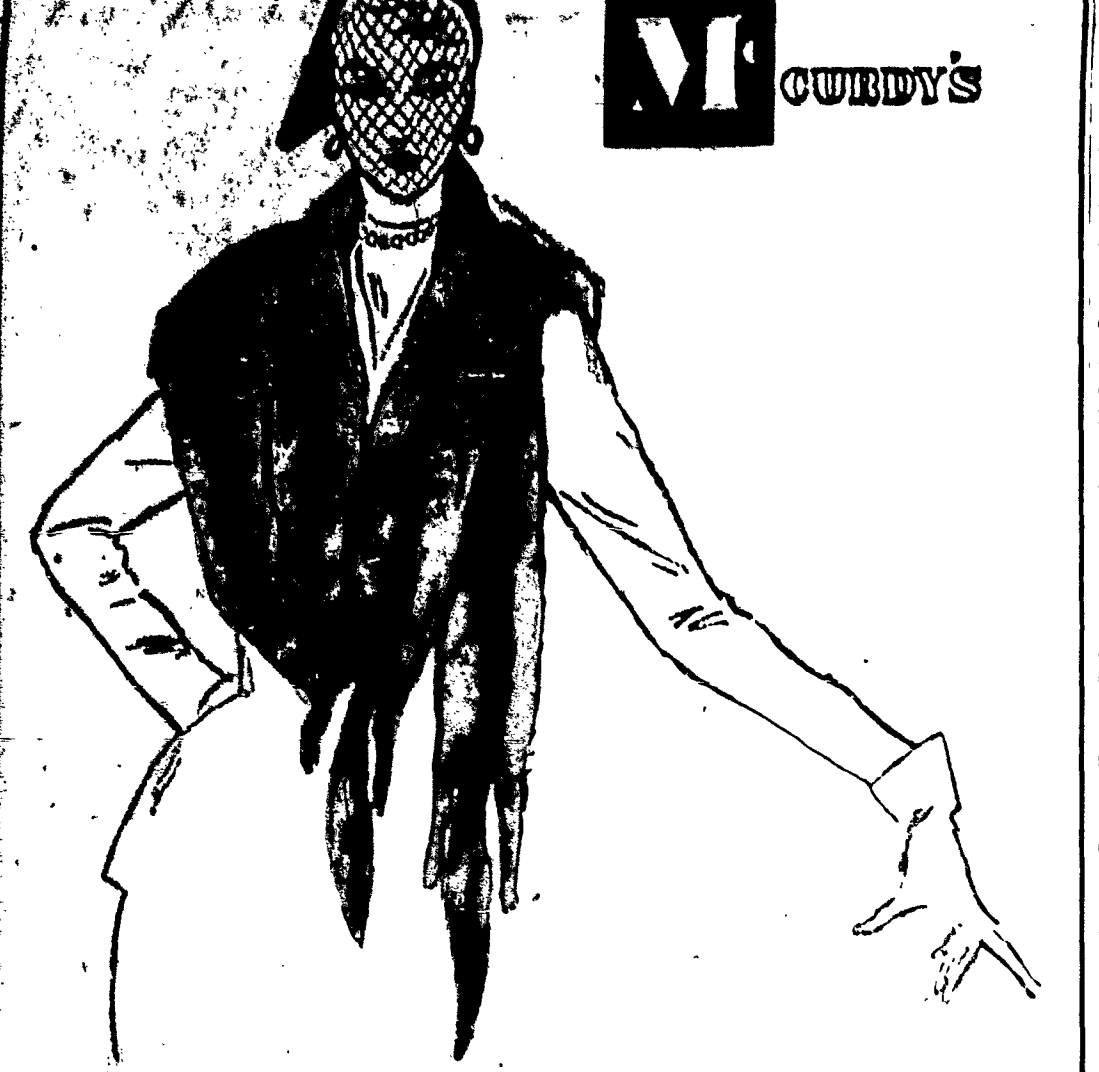
