Recalls Dedication

The memory, the spirit, the very personality of the late Rt. Rev. Magr. Edward M. Lyons, M. A., rector of St. Andrew's Seminary and a member of its faculty for 21 years, will permente ceremonies dedicating the new Buffalo Road building next Thursday, Nov. 80,

Erection of the building had been blondigner Lyons dream for several years. The very night before he died last blay he walked the short distance from the Mt. William House en the new Seminary properly to inspect the progress of its construction.

All who attend the dedication will have a prayer in their hearing for the repose of his soul, sind a regret that the kindly Moneignor could not be present for this, the examination of his tondest hopes and the monument of his greatest

Apparently in excellent health, he had been bustly engazed in the many details of administration of the seminary he had headed for 13 years. and in overseeing construction of the new building.

Monsigner Lyons died in his aleep Thursday morning. May 4, 1950. He was found after falling to appear for his usual celebration of 5:30 a.m. Mane in the St. William Blouse

The 56-year-old pricat was honored in death by a huge gathering of priests of the Rochester and Syracuse Dioceses, members of St. Andrew's Lay Fraternity which he founded for former semin arians, and the general public who had known him as a teacher or as assistant paster of St Augustine's parish

Burial took place in the priests, plot in Holy Sepuchre Cemetery on May 8 following solemn funeral rites at Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedrat

Eulogy at the Solemn Re gutem Mass was delivered by the Rev Rr Maynard A Con

nell, then professor of Sacred Eloquence at St. Bernard's Seminary, who one month later succeeded Monsignor Lyons as St. Andrew's rector. Praising the Monsignor as "an honor to the priesthoood and a glory to God," Father Connell said: "To each task he brought the same unselfish devotion to duty. Always, every where, he showed himself the same kind, sympathetic, understanding priest.

"Humble and devout - quiet and unassuming - probably the only boast he ever uttered: the words he whispered each morning over a white host and a golden cup . . . His greatest monument - the only monument a wise priest can ever covet -- is the inspiration, the lasting love, the grateful atfection of those whose lives he touched."

Born January 23, 1894, in Fairport, Edward Lyons was graduated from Immaculate Conception Parochial School, Rochester. Following a bustness course at Rochester Cathedral High School, he worked for a year before en tering St. Andrew's Seminary He was ordained June 10

1922 in St. Patrick's Cathed ral by Bishon Thomas F Hick ev and appointe i assistant pas for of St Augustine's Church where he served for seven Named to the faculty of St.

Andrew's Seminary on June 29, 1929 as a teacher of history and religion, Father Lyons was selected to establish the St Andrew's House on Greig Street first boarding home for out of Rochester seminarians. In June, 1937, he succeeded

red Heart Pro-Cathedrai. His Excellency Bishop Kearney presided and preached the sermon.

On Nov 11 of that year Father Lyons was one of 21 diocesan priests honored by His Holiness Pone Plus XII as a domestic Prelate with the title of Right Reverend Mon-

signor. Always intensity interested in education, he was chairman of the Minor Seminary Section of the National Catholic Education Association from 1944 to 1946, and had been a member of the Association's executive board since that time,

In 1949, Monsigner Lyons accompanied Bishop Kearney on the Bishop's "ad limina" visit to Rome. While in the papal mosaic factory in Vatican City the Rector ordered a large mosaic, to depict Our Mother of Good Counsel, which will hang above the tabernacle in the chapel of the new Semmary building.

In Ireland he celebrated Mass in the little church where his father was baptized, and through a second cousin, a Missionary Father of the Sacred liears met seven other distant relatives whom he never had know a

Confessing recurrent home sickness he said he had been deeply touched by the relegram he received from the senior graduates of St Andrew's Seminary - the first seminary his 20 years at the institution.


