Final Tribute Paid To Sister Mary de Lourdes

Solemn funeral services for Sister Mary de Lourdes Kennedy, of the Order of Mercy, were conducted Saturday, Nov. 18 in the Motherhouse Chapel on Blossom Road.

Sister Mary de Lourdes died Thursday, Nov. 16, 1950 at the Motherhouse.

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas P. Connors was celebrant of the Solemn High Mass; the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John M. Duffy was deacon and the Rev. Dr. Charles J. Mahoney was sub-deacon. Rev. John T. Callahan, Chaplain at the Motherhouse, was Master of Ceremonies.

Present in the sanctuary were the Rt. Rev. Msgr. George W. Eckl, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph S. Cameron, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Lawrence B. Casey, the Reverend Fathers Louis Edelman, Francis Hester, Elmer Heindl, Francis Marks, Thomas Reddington, Albert Shamon, Edward Shamon, George Weinmann and Father Benjamin, O.F.M. of Siena College, Albany.

Sister de Lourdes was for years a teacher in the Rochester city public schools previous to her entering the Sisters of Mercy in 1926. Since her entrance in religion she taught in St. Thomas' School, Rochester and in Elmira and Owego where she was principal of St. Cecilia's and St. Patrick's schools.

AFTER LEAVING Owego, Sister joined the faculty of Aquinas Institute and in 1937 was appointed supervisor of the Catholic schools of the Rochester diocese taught by the Sisters of Mercy. She held this post of duty until the opening of the current school year when falling health caused her to give up her active work in the school system.

Sister M. de Lourdes was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Kennedy, life long members of Old St. Mary's parish.

Surviving Sister de Lourdes are her sister, Sister Mary Bernadette of the Order of Mercy and a brother, John Kennedy of Philadelphia; and a niece, Miss Regina Kennedy, principal of school No. 23 of this city.

Burial was in the Sisters' plot in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

21 Diocesan Priests Serving in Japan

Tokyo — (NC) — The arrival here of a diocesan priest from Spain brings to 21 the total number of vicars of diocesan priests working in Japan as missionaries. There are 14 from Australia, three from Spain and one each from the United States, Hungary, the Netherlands and Czechoslovakia.

This may be a record of secular priests working in a missionary country. Almost all missionaries are from religious Orders and congregations.

Convert-Author Drops Citizenship

Manila — (NC) — Francis Burton Harrison, author, convert and one-time Governor General of the Philippines, arrived here by airplane bent upon spending the rest of his life in the Philippines.

Mr. Harrison gave up his American citizenship to become a Filipino citizen. He was reared an Episcopalian but earlier this year was received into the Catholic Church in Stamford, Conn. He was born in New York. His father was Burton Norwell Harrison, an attorney who served as private secretary to Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederate States of America. His mother was Constance Cary Harrison playwright and historian.

Vatican Archeological Volume Off Press

Rome — (NS) — A volume dealing with the work carried on by Vatican excavators in the grottoes of St. Peter's Basilica has come from the press. It is announced here. The first copy is expected to be presented soon to Pope Pius XII.

Collaborating in printing the volume were Italian government printers and printers employed by the Vatican. Besides the reports on the Vatican archeological work, the volume contains numerous photographs of ancient tombs under the great basilica.
