**Holiday Mailing Deadlines Given**  
Finish your Christmas shopping for distant friends quickly and get the packages in the mail. That's the urgent plea of Postmaster Donald A. Dalley.

December 15 is the suggested date for out-of-State Christmas cards, and a week before Christmas for last minute local greetings.

If everyone waits and the mailings all come in together at the last minute, we will be swamped," the Postmaster declares. "In addition to heavy Christmas mailings, the post office must handle the regular mailings including increased commercial shipments at this time of year."

The Postmaster renewed his appeal that packages be wrapped stoutly, using stiff corrugated fiberboard, strong outer paper, and heavy twine. Fragile items must be individually cushioned in a strong box to prevent breakage.

The Postmaster advised that post office windows are most crowded at lunch time and late in the afternoon. He recommends mailing packages before 10 a.m. and between 1:30 and 3:30 p.m. to avoid long lines and aching feet.
