4 Soloists Listed To Sing Messiah

Directed by J. Theodore Holtenbach, the following soloists will appear with the 290 members of the Rochester Oratorio Society and the 23-piece symphony orchestra in the presentation of George Friedrich Handel's "Messiah" at the Eastman Theater Dec. 20.

Soprano—Miss Rose Dirman of New York City, teacher of voice and well known for her many radio, concert and operatic appearances under conductors including Koussevitzky and Rodzinsky. In 1940 Miss Dirman sang leading soprano roles in the opera presentations at the Berkshire Music Festival.

Alto—Miss Mary Williams, 20-year-old senior student at the Eastman School of Music, studying under Dr. Herman Genhart and Nicolas Konraty. Last March her rich contralto voice thrilled Kilbourn Hall audiences as she portrayed the dynamic Madame Flora in Gian-Carlo Menotti's "The Medium."

Tenor—Giles Hobin, Eastman School graduate and very popular with audiences in Rochester and vicinity on his numerous appearances in concerts and oratorios, and on both radio and television programs.

Bass—Robert Falk of New York City, who studied in Sweden, South Africa, and obtained his B. A. degree at Cornell University. Nurse's Aides Call Sounded

A call has been issued to all inactive trained Red Cross Nurse's Aides to head the needs of Civil Defense and reactivate themselves in the many phases of that vital set-up where they will pay a most important role.

The call came today from Dr. Albert D. Kaiser, Medical Director of Civil Defense, and a member of the Board of Directors of the Rochester Red Cross Chapter.

In a letter which he sent out Monday, to all nurse's aides who are not functioning in that capacity now, Dr. Kaiser said: "Several thousand Nurse's Aides are urgently needed to meet Civil Defense quotas."

"This means asking every trained Aide in Rochester and vicinity to volunteer her services in some capacity. It also means training more and more classes as fast as they can be recruited, interviewed and organized."

He urged getting in touch immediately with Nurse's Aide Chairman, Mrs. Cleland G. Ross, American Red Cross Chapter House, 276 Clinton Ave. South.

Air Mail Late Christmas Cards

Postmaster Donald A. Dalley said today that Christmas mailings handled at the local post office this year appear headed for an all-time high. Postal employees are working at top speed to keep up with the record flood.

Greetings for out-of-town delivery should be posted by Friday night, December 15, to reach their destination in time. After that date, the Postmaster warns, use Air Mail or Special Delivery stamps, or else send Happy New Year cards.

Christmas cards for local delivery should be mailed "at least a week before Christmas, and sooner if possible," he stated. The Postmaster declared that despite the heavy volume of mail this year he is confident it will be possible to deliver every last card and parcel before Christmas if the public continues to cooperate.
