Holidays' Heavy Drinkers Warned About Driving

Excessive holiday drinking, which was condemned by Bishop Joseph F. Flannelly, St. Patrick's Cathedral administrator in New York, has been followed by a warning from Rochester's Police Chief T. Herbert Kilip, that driving should not follow such drinking.

In Rochester, the testing of drunken drivers will result in more arrests and convictions, the police believe.

The testing program has been in effect for a year and according to City Chemist John A. Temmerman's report, made for Dec. 12, 1949 to Dec. 12, 1950, 111 motorists were charged with driving while intoxicated, and 78 percent were convicted for 82 percent convictions. Thirteen cases are still pending in court.

Among those arrested for drunken driving have been five women. In the arrests were seven felonies, motorists indicted for a second time. Three pedestrians were killed because of drunkenness, Temmerman stated.

Strict enforcement is promised by city police. A conviction for driving while intoxicated automatically revokes the offender's operator license. In addition he might be fined up to \$100 for the first offense.

Rochester's program on testing drivers has drawn the attention of authorities in Hornell, Syracuse and Richmond County, Staten Island, and as far away as Sioux City, Iowa. The program has been featured in the "Public Safety Magazine." Since the test was begun the city has had four fewer accident deaths so far this year than in the corresponding period of 1949.

Padua H. S. Holds 13 Hour Devotion
