House For Use As Convent Bought By St. Anne Parish

Purchase of a nine-room frame dwelling and plans for converting it into a convent for the nine teaching Sisters of St. Anne's School, Brighton, were announced today by the Rev. William J. Naughton, pastor of St. Anne's Church.

Located at 191 East Henrietta Rd., the house is on the second piece of property south of the school, which is at 153 East Henrietta Road, at the corner of Brighton Park.

OBTAINED FOR \$16,200 from the Harmon Estate, the dwelling will be altered under the direction of Architect James Arnold, Father Naughton stated. Explaining the purchase of an existing house instead of the construction of a new building, Father Naughton said:

"In view of the increasingly rapid growth of the parish, we felt it advisable to wait until the school enrollment is stabilized before considering the construction of a permanent convent."

Staffed by the Sisters of St. Joseph, St. Anne's School now has more than 350 pupils. Sister Marilou Marie, principal, and eight other nuns now commute daily to and from Nazareth Motherhouse in East Auzare.

More than 500 persons visited the new convent of St. Peter and Paul's parish on High Street Elmira, Sunday into which the eight Sisters of St. Joseph who teach in the parish school moved Monday.

Visitors inspected the new building, its facilities and modern equipment.

The Rev. Hubert A. Bisky, pastor of St. Peter and Paul's Church, said that he was "pleasantly surprised by the large number of persons who turned out for the inspection."

Father Bisky reported a large number of floral tributes received at the convent from the contractors and friends of the Sisters.

A special guest, the Rev. William J. Naughton, who left the St. Peter and Paul's parish in June, attended the inspection. Father Naughton is now at St. Ann's Church in Rochester. Plans for the new \$75,000 building were drawn last Spring when Father Naughton was pastor.

Construction began early in the Summer and, except for a few delays due to difficulty in obtaining scarce materials and fixtures, progress was steady. The building, now practically complete, is equipped with the latest in modern plumbing and heating facilities and is comfortably furnished.

General contractors for the new convent were the Mitchell Bros. of Elmira, headed by Charles J. Mitchell. The architect was Leo E. Considine of the local firm of Haskell, Considine & Haskell. Other local contractors were: Charles A. Unold, electric wiring; C. R. Evans Corp., heating; Hogg-Nichols Inc., plumbing.

Trapp Family Book Gets Top Honor

"The Story of the Trapp Family Singers," Maria Augusta Trapp's first person recital of the adventures of her world-famous singing family, has been voted the "outstanding non-fiction book of the year" by the Catholic Writers Guild of America.

Selection of Mrs. Trapp's book was based on a poll of presidents of Catholic universities and colleges throughout the country, with the final decision made by a panel consisting of the Very Rev. Msgr. John S. Middleton, Secretary for Education of the Archdiocese of New York; Rev. Robert I. Cannon, S.J., former President of Fordham University; Dr. Francis X. Connolly, Professor of English at Fordham; Joseph A. Duffy, publishers' consultant, and Gertra Palmer, prominent Catholic writer.

Now in its ninth printing by the J. B. Lippincott Co., the story previously has been chosen as a "Book of the Month" by the Catholic Book Club; as a "member's dividend" by the Catholic Literary Foundation, and as "one of the 50 outstanding books of the year" by the American Library Association. Shortly after its publication the author was presented with the "Benemerenti Medal" by His Holiness Pope Pius XII.

Catholic Authors Day Observance Set

Webster Groves, Mo. — (RNS) Catholic Authors Day will be observed throughout the country for the first time on Feb. 20, it was announced here by the Gal-sponsor of the day, the Association of Living Catholic Authors. Scheduled to become an annual event of Catholic Press Month (February), this year's observance will have as its theme: "The pen is the voice of the soul."

The observance aims to "encourage the Catholic public to be proud of their Catholic writers" and to "encourage Catholics who write to become Catholic writers."

Founded here by Sister Mary Joseph S.L., the Gallery of Living Catholic Authors has been operating since 1932 to promote interest in contemporary Catholic writers.

Polish Regime Outlaws Holydays

London — (RNS)—Five Roman Catholic holydays have been abolished as non-working days under a bill passed by the Polish parliament. It was reported here. The bill did not mention the particular holydays.

According to the bill, which was enacted into law immediately, the Communist government will hereafter recognize only twelve non-working days, including Communist national holidays, in a year. Sunday is not classified as a non-working day.

Catholic sources here said the new law is the latest in a series of measures adopted by the Communist regime to discourage church attendance. It has long been the Communist practice, they said, to hold special factory meetings on Sundays and holydays, as well as youth demonstrations, "peace rallies," and other events.

"Bone Dry" Measure Oklahoma City — (RNS)—A bill to restore Oklahoma's so-called "bone dry" law has been introduced in the State Legislature by Sen. Herbert Hope of Mayaville as part of the program of the United Dry organization.
