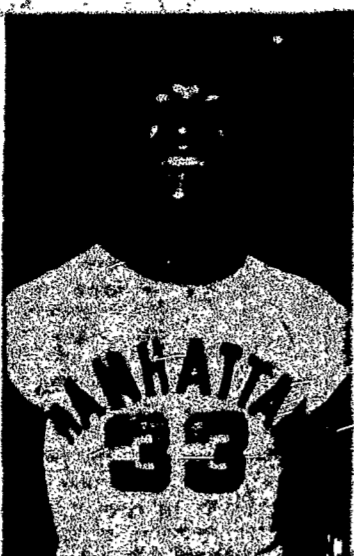
Visitors to the chapel for the first time Monday were impressed with the full length stain glass windows depicting the lives of the Saints who are patrons of the Order of Mercy.

Catholic Group Of Psychologists Gains Members

New York — (NC) — The American Catholic Psychological Association now has 270 members in 28 States, the Nation's Capital, and Canada, an announcement from the association's headquarters here reports.

A total of 215 are constituent members, and 55 are associates. To be a constituent member one must also belong to the American Psychological Association.

Dr. Joseph F. Kubis of Fordham University is president-elect of the Catholic association. The Rev. John W. Stafford, C.S.V., of the Catholic University of America, is the current president. Executive secretary of the organization is the Rev. William C. Eiler, S.J., of Fordham University and the treasurer is Dr. M. Gertrude Reiman of the Louisville Mental Hygiene Clinic.

Purpose of the association, founded in 1948 are to advance "the legitimate acceptance of psychology in Catholic circles," and "to integrate psychology, both theoretically and practically, with Catholic principles."
