### Back American Tradition, KC Told By Law Professor

Responsibility of a patriotic degree of Americans to practice the highest qualities of American tradition was stressed by Prof. John W. McDonald of Cornell Law School at the annual Lincoln Day dinner of Rochester Fourth Degree Assembly, Knights of Columbus, Sunday at Hotel Sheraton.

More than 110 persons including knights, their wives and guests heard His Excellency Bishop Kearney and Professor McDonald in the principal address.

The law educator said that those who ask for freedom of speech and press must guard zealously the rights and privileges of dissenters—so long as the dissenters are loyal to the nation which guarantees them their rights.

DWELLING ON tradition, he said, it demands fair play from its beneficiaries and goes back to days and to struggles which antedate the formation of this nation. "Tradition," he added, "was itself revolutionary both in concept and in origin."

"Never in our history shall we engage in which hunts, character assassination and trial by any other means than by a free jury of free men, influenced only by the desire to obtain a true verdict under correct instructions on the dispassionate law," he declared.

When Daniel F. Driscoll, the present postmaster, took office in 1933, Mr. Harding took a route in the western part of the city and he has been there since. Before that "Bill" had delivered mail to every section of the city.

Mr. Harding will mark his 70th birthday Feb. 21, but those who know him find that hard to believe. He's still as spry as most of the younger carriers, his associates say. He has long been one of Geneva's outstanding sports personalities and fans. He has refereed basketball and football games many times.
