World Peace Heads List Issued By NCCW Directors

World Peace headed the list of ten statements issued by the Board of Directors of the National Council of Catholic Women at its recent annual meeting in their Washington, D. C. headquarters February 9 to 10.

The other nine statements of the Board included references to immigration provisions with relation to the internal security act, reciprocal trade agreements, famine in India; noteworthy social justice anniversaries in 1951; Civil Defense; military service and work away from home; rent control in defense areas; price regulation; and parental attitude on TV shows.

WITH RELATIONS to World Peace, the Board called upon those responsible for the nation's destiny to exert every effort to reach a settlement of our international problems in harmony with Christian principles.

Three significant social-justice anniversaries in the Church were noted for this year. May 15 is a double anniversary. It marks the sixtieth year since Leo XIII's encyclical on the Condition of Labor and the 20th since Pius XII issued his encyclical on constructing the Social Order.

With further reference to the current crisis, the Board urged price roll-backs, where warranted, to ease heavy pressures on family budgets, particularly on necessities of life. Rent controls were recommended in defense areas with housing shortages and unwarranted rise in rents.

Recruiting of young people for the general electric service center, sales and service on all traffic appliances, was the main theme of the meeting.

High School Art Exhibit Open To Catholic Students

Scholastic Magazine, co-sponsored by Sibley, Lindsay and Curry Company, will hold the ninth exhibition of high school art in the Fourth Floor Gallery of Sibley's store from Feb. 24 to March 10.

Pupils attending a public, parochial or private high school in Central Western New York are eligible to submit art work.

Students entering receiving awards in Rochester will be forwarded to Carnegie Institute, Pittsburgh, Pa. to compete for a place in the National Scholastic Art Exhibition to be held there sometime in May.

There are 25 classifications, from oil painting to photography. The local or regional award consists of a gold Scholastic Key Only in Pittsburgh will cash prizes be awarded.

IN EACH AREA at least one scholarship will be awarded to the high school senior submitting the best portfolio of art work. There are eighty three accredited art schools throughout this country who are offering these scholarships.

In Rochester 34 judges all of whom are creative artists and craftsmen in their own right selected the work. Thirteen of these judges were from out of town.

Each afternoon and four evenings during the exhibition, demonstrations will be conducted in the fourth floor gallery by pupils of the art classes of high schools in and around Rochester.

Mrs. Hawley F. Ward, Public Relations Counselor for Sibley's store is in charge of the exhibition for the store, and Miss Marjorie A. Lush, Director of Art Education in the Rochester Public Schools, is Chairman of the Central Western New York Regional Advisory Committee.
