At mass the members will attend a coronet and a coronation dinner to be served at the only Irish church in Rochester, the Episcopal Church, at 12:30 p.m.

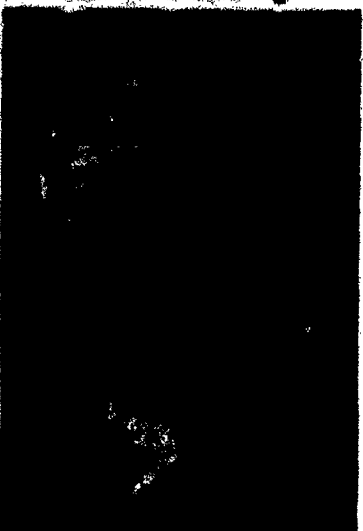
An early dinner will be held at the Hibernian club for the remainder of the day and evening. Irish and modern dancing, refreshments and entertainment will round out the day's activities at the club.

Son Celebrates Requiem For J. J. McCarthy

Solemn Requiem Mass for Jeremiah J. McCarthy, recognized throughout the country as an authority on fire alarm systems, was offered by his son, the Rev. Charles J. McCarthy of St. Bernard's Seminary faculty, on Saturday, March 3 in immaculate Conception Church.

Mr. McCarthy, 76, of 128 Hawley St., died February 22, 1951 after a long illness. Until his retirement he had been superintendent of the Fire and Police Telegraph for 22 years.
