Lay Fraternity Sets Talk On Catholicism In India

Status of Catholicism in India will be outlined by a native Indian priest at the monthly meeting of the St. Andrew's Seminary Lay Fraternity at 8:15 p.m. Monday, Apr. 23, in the St. William Faculty House, 1150 Buffalo Rd.

Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, with the Rev. Dr. Maynard A. Connell, Seminary rector and Fraternity moderator, officiating will open the meeting, according to James H. Farrell, president.

QUESTIONS OF THE meeting will be the Rev. Justin Diraviam, of the Diocese of Trichinopoly, only native Indian priest in the United States at this time, who is in the Rochester Diocese for a series of Sunday sermons through May 6.

Father Diraviam will give the sermons at Masses next Sunday, Apr. 22, in Perkinville; and on Sunday, Apr. 29 in Owego. On May 6 he will be in the pulpit of Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedral. He is here under the auspices of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

The Indian priest is available for talks before organizations from now until May 5. He is staying at St. Bernard's Seminary.

CDA Told Origin Of Sacrifice By Fr. Langworthy

Speaking before 125 members and guests of Court St. Joseph, Catholic Daughters of America at the 40th annual banquet of the organization at the Baron Steuben Hotel, the Rev. Charles Langworthy, assistant chaplain at Cornell University described sacrifice in religion.

Tracing the history of the offering of sacrifice to God, Father Langworthy explained how, as time went on, this device became subject to abuse and finally came to be no more than an external formality. The need for a perfect sacrifice that would end all others became apparent, he said.

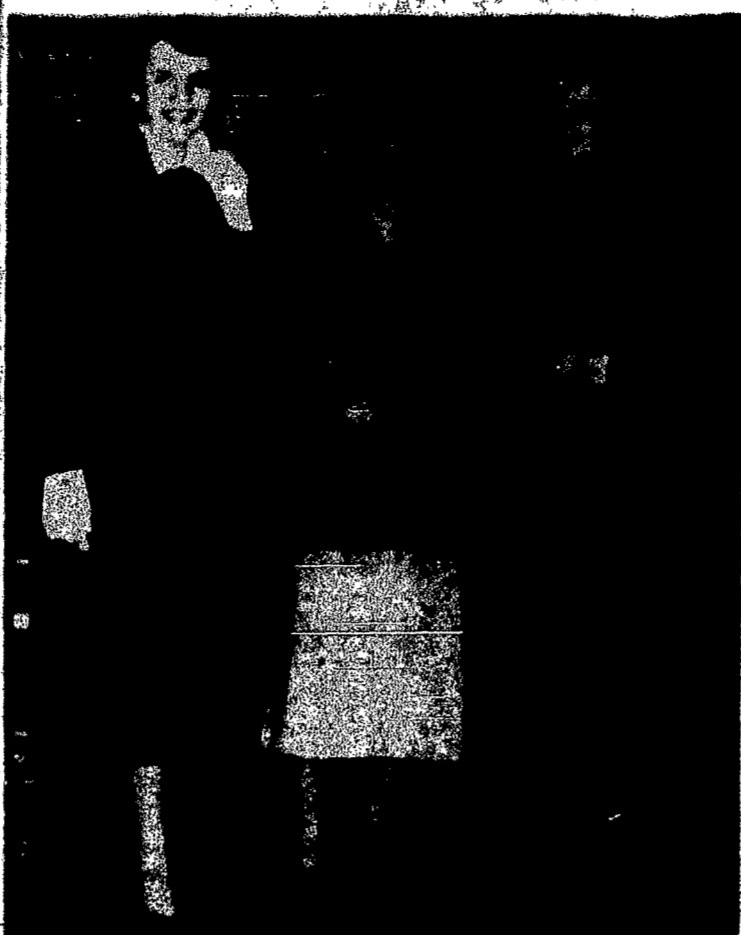
"THE SON OF GOD became man and died on the cross to meet this need," he said. "But the only other members of the human race who offered this execution as a sacrifice, an act of religion, were the little handful of friends at the foot of the cross. How should this act, never to be repeated in history, benefit the rest of mankind until the end of time?"

"Christ in His mercy knew that we sinners of the 20th Century are separated by many miles and many centuries from His great act of sacrifice so He arranged the night before He died that if we could not go to Calvary, Calvary should come to us across the years and across the miles in the Mass."

The banquet, which was under the general chairmanship of Miss Mary Hill, was attended by guests from courts in Addison, Hornell, Elmira and Waverly.

Other entertainment included readings by Mrs. Julia Carleton and solos by Joseph Lasso, accompanied by Mrs. Joseph Clancy. Mrs. Robert Fitzgerald, grand regent was toastmistress and the speaker was introduced by the Rev. Joseph Dalley, assistant pastor of St. Patrick's Church and chaplain of the Court.

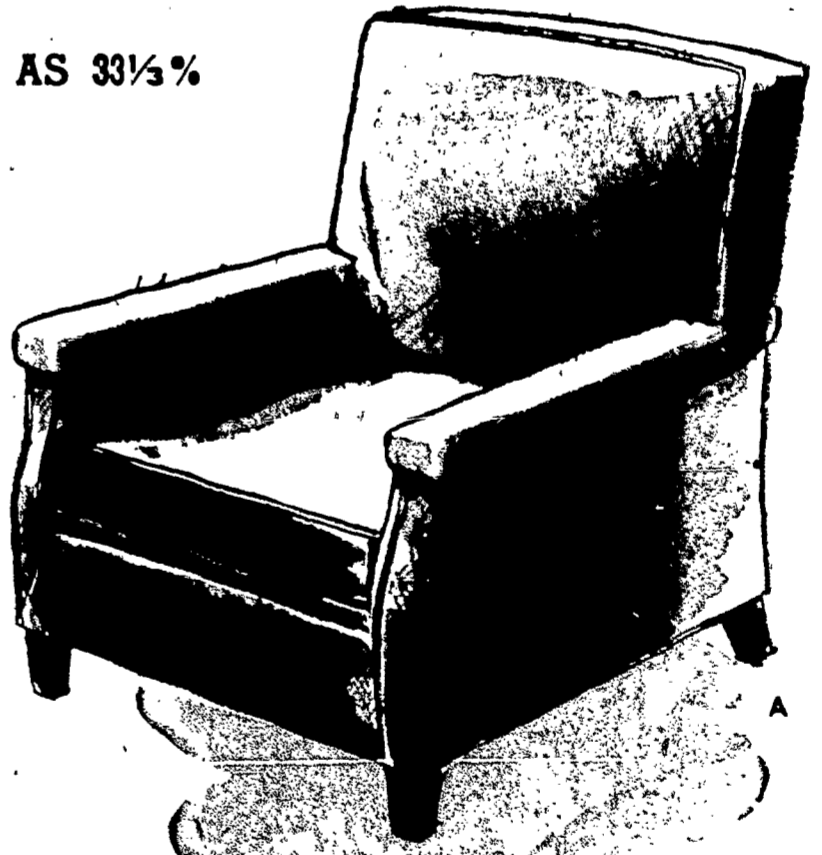
Arrangements for the pilgrimage are in the hands of a committee headed by Sam Bona and Thomas Metildi.

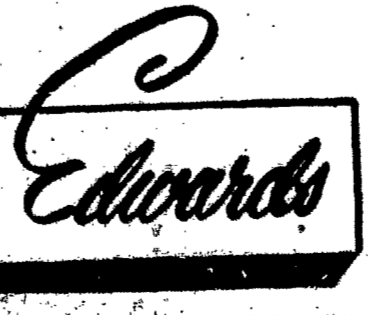
