**Offer Every Day's Actions,  
First Saturday Club Told**

Hornell — Making each petty annoyance and discomfort of daily life count towards salvation for one's self and others was advocated by the Rev. John Keen in an address to the First Saturday Club, DCCW, May 30 at Hotel Sherwood.

Father Keen, pastor of St. John of the Cross Church in Whitesville, was guest speaker at the fifth in a series of "First Saturday" luncheons sponsored by the Hornell District. More than 50 women from St. Ann's and St. Ignace Loyola parishes attended the luncheon which was dedicated to "Our Lady of Fatima."

"In the fifth apparition of Our Lady of Fatima to the three peasant Portuguese children, the Blessed Virgin stressed the efficacy of penance and sacrifice," Father Keen pointed out. "Although the little children, in their childlike innocence, had little need for rigorous self-discipline so far as they themselves were concerned, they learned from the 'Beautiful Lady' the need for self-denial and sacrifice to appease the wrath of the all-just God," he explained.

**RECAPITULATION**, as explained by Our Lady of Fatima to the three children, does not mean the undertaking of difficult actions, Father Keen continued. It means, primarily, the acceptance of the petty annoyances and annoyances, which beset each normal person in his daily life, as a spirit of resignation and the desire to do all things for Christ.

"If," Father Keen concluded, "each of you will offer every action of the day as a sublime prayer to God, you will not only merit grace for yourselves, but will present a powerful plea for the conversion of sinners to the all-just and all-merciful God."

The Cross of Jesus Christ, and Catholic men who will teach others to lift their eyes to that Cross is the "only remedy, the only cure, the only panacea" for today's world ill, was the message of the Rev. Hubert Sweeney, C.P. given to the Rochester Police Holy Name Society, Sunday.

More than 240 law enforcement officers, the largest number to attend, were present for the Corporate Communion and Breakfast following. The attendance record covered the Society's 14 years of existence.

Mass was celebrated in St. Joseph's Church by His Excellency Bishop Kearney assisted by the Very Rev. John S. Randall, chaplain of the Society.

Bishop Kearney in a short sermon after the Mass praised the policemen for their services to society. He said that interference that the police are corrupt are largely built upon the testimony of known perjurers.

"OUR COUNTRY richly blessed, blessed as no other Nation in the history of the world is rapidly becoming first in crime first in divorce, first in the slaughter of innocent children, first in outpaganing pagan Rome," Father Sweeney said in the principal breakfast address.

"Home life is being wrecked on the rocks of social activities and the hand that plays with a cocktail glass or leads a dog on a leash is more powerful than the hand that rocks a cradle. Consequently we are all searching for peace."

The greatest need of the hour, Father Sweeney told the police officers "is that man stop in their mad rush along the highway of life to kneel before this crucified God who alone has the power to lift men out of the mire of their wretchedness and to lead them to the heights of God."
