3 Hornell Sodalties Join In Rites Honoring Mary

Hornell — Personal consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary was strongly advocated by the Rev. James F. Slattery at World Sodality Day ceremonies here Sunday.

Father Slattery, assistant pastor of St. Ignatius Loyola Church was guest speaker at the exercises which were held on the lawn of St. James Mercy Hospital. Sodalties of the Blessed Virgin from St. James Mercy Hospital of Nursing, St. Ann's and St. Ignatius Loyola Churches joined in the observance.

"Mary asked in her appearance at Fatima that each of us be consecrated to her Immaculate Heart," Father Slattery pointed out. "Through this dedication of individuals and nations she promised to bring peace to a torn and troubled world."

"It is particularly fitting that we should renew this consecration on World Sodality Day, the 25th anniversary date of Mary's first appearance to the three peasant children at Fatima."

FOUR ELEMENTS are essential for personal consecration, Father Slattery explained. The first is that the soul be in the state of sanctifying grace. "There can be no peace in the world," the priest stated, "unless there is first peace in the heart of the individual."

Secondly, the priest explained, is the desire to live one's life in a spirit of penance. Heroic acts are not necessary, he continued. Observance of the law of God, cheerful acceptance of the little daily trials and crosses and fulfillment of one's daily duties are sufficient.

Daily recitation of the Rosary and reception of Holy Communion on the first Saturday of each month as an act of reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary are the other two elements, Father Slattery explained.

"On Mother's Day it is natural and fitting that we honor our earthly mothers," the priest went on. "Let us not, however, forget Mary, our spiritual mother. If we heed her message of Fatima we shall find peace in our hearts and, eventually, peace in the world."

CROWNING of the May queen preceded Father Slattery's talk. Miss Mary Shea was selected from fellow members of Our Lady of Lourdes Sodality to place a floral crown on the head of a large statue of the Blessed Virgin. The coronation symbolized the devotion of sodalists to the Blessed Mother and the acknowledgment of her as May Queen.

Ceremonies closed with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. The Rev. John Healy, spiritual director of Our Lady of Lourdes
